

Even if we didn't win, we surely had team spirit as is shown in this picture. Coach Harner urges the boys on from the bench.







DEDICATION

On November 7, 1954, the fulfillment of a dream that Greenwood had held in abeyance for twelve long years was finally accomplished. On that date, most of the citizens of Greenwood, along with many others from the surrounding territory, gathered in the new gymnasium to watch and participate in the dedication of the new Greenwood Junior-Senior High School. Allan P. Dreyer, Chairman of the Dedication Committee and Treasurer of the Greenwood School Building Corporation's Board of Directors, presided during the dedication program.

Preceding the program, the Greenwood High School Band gave a short concert as the townspeople filed into the huge gymnasium and took their seats. Many had never seen the building's interior before, and all were pleased, proud, and a bit wide-eyed. As Mr. Jarrold Holeman and the Band finished their part of the program, the Color Guard of the Greenwood American Legion Post 252 presented the flag on the stage in a very impressive military manner. The band played the National Anthem, and Rev. Robert L. Marlett gave the invocation.

Next, Mr. Dreyer commented on the absence of Stanley Porter, Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Porter was recovering from injuries suffered in an automobile accident a few days before. Chairman Dreyer read a letter from Mr. Porter in which he asked that the dedication not be postponed because of his accident, since he felt that no one man was of such importance.

Mr. Dreyer introduced the guests on the stage, commenting on the part each had played in the planning and building of the school. Mrs. Lowell B. Springer sang "Bless This House" by Brahe, accompanied by Miss Elizabeth Todd.

Marley A. Lasiter, President of the Greenwood School Building Corporation, spoke on the work involved in this accomplishment and the future of it. He then presented the "key," symbolic of building ownership, to Mrs. Agnes Tilson Adcock, who, as President of the School Board, was the official representative of the town of Greenwood. Mrs. Adcock, Mr. M. Dale Baughman, the High School Principal, and Robert Garris, President of the Student Council, all commented on the importance of this accomplishment to the school system, citizens, and community at large.

Robert W. Demaree sang "The Builders' by Cadman, accompanied by Miss Geraldine Bagby.

On behalf of the Greenwood School Foundation, Mrs. Robert W. Demaree, Vice-Chairman of the Foundation, presented Mrs. Adcock, with the equipment and furnishings which the Foundation had purchased with funds donated by the community. Mrs. Adcock received this presentation with thanks. Mr. Wilbur Young, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, spoke for a few minutes on behalf of his department. Mr. Dreyer next invited all present to attend the open house, which was to take place immediately following the close of the dedication program.

REV. ROBERT E. GREEN gave the benediction.






MRS. MARGARET WEDDLE has been the school secretary at Green wood High School for four years. She graduated from Central Busine College in 1919.






