HISTRIONIC EFFORTS REQUIRED ABILITY










A MOMENT OF ACADEMICS . . .
















A MOMENT OF CLUBS





Inaugurating a new award system demanded much time and considerable effort on the part of G.H.S. lettermen. In the past, an athlete earned several letters in different sports. 
GAA girls held their annual camping trip at Mc-Cormick's Creek. Horseback riding, boating, and hiking highlighted their two day stay.




















