





Graduation symbolizes beginning for Seniors of '73







Prom creates memories for Juniors, Seniors








Cheerleaders backbone of school spirit


Boys', girls' Boosters lift Woodmen spirits



Music fills halls as choirs sing way through year



Bandsmen devote long hours to GCHS music










Home Economics, office workers serve school







Freshmen average 18 points a game during 4-3-1 quest


This years freshmen football team finished their season with a 4-3-1 record. In scoring an average of 18.2 points a game was achieved by this team that shows great promise in the coming years.

Commenting on his team, Coach Walsman stated, "This was a very good group of boys to coach, and we had a good season. In summary of the year, I was extremely proud of this group."





The Woodmen scored 1342 points an average of 63.9 against the opponents total of 1259 points for an average of 59.9 points per game.


The Woodmen grabbed 717 rebounds against the opponents 665 total.













Foreign language increases awareness of students






Math students learn practical applications


Social Science offers overview of society

Social Sciences, encompasing Citizenship, World History, Government, International Relations, Sociology, and Psychology, offer students an overview of the society in which he lives. History courses bring into perspective the world situation dealing with crisis from earliest days of man through present world conflicts. Students learned the historical significance of world problems from many viewpoints while engaging in stategy and war games.

International relations students studied world problems not only as they relate to the U.S. but also their effects on other world interests. Discussions of these problems became a 'mini-United Nations', as students took various

sides on world issues. Two social science students, Volker Seyffarth and Gary Saltsgaver, attended a World Affairs Workshop dealing with the world implications of problems facing modern Germany.

Sociology and psychology classes study man as he relates to his environment. Observations of man as he faces his daily problems were made by students and analyzed by the classes. 'Role playing games' were used to better acquaint students with problems faced in other social strata. First hand experiences contributed to students seeing the many roles man plays and his reaction to social situations.




ABOVE LEFT — Group discussions and party meetings were a part of social science classes. Students got together to discuss problems, role play, and discover new solutions to world problems.







Business skills prepare students for jobs after graduation




I-Arts teach future skills


Advanced girls classes prepared physical education activities for Southwest Elementary and then taught these activities. Other activities included building of greater skills and developing interest in lifetime sports.




Summer school attendance runs high as students complete




New popcorn popper boosts concession sales for Prom; Class of '74 captures Queen title for third year


"Popcorn! Get your hot, buttered popcorn!"




'Carousel' musical production of spring '72
