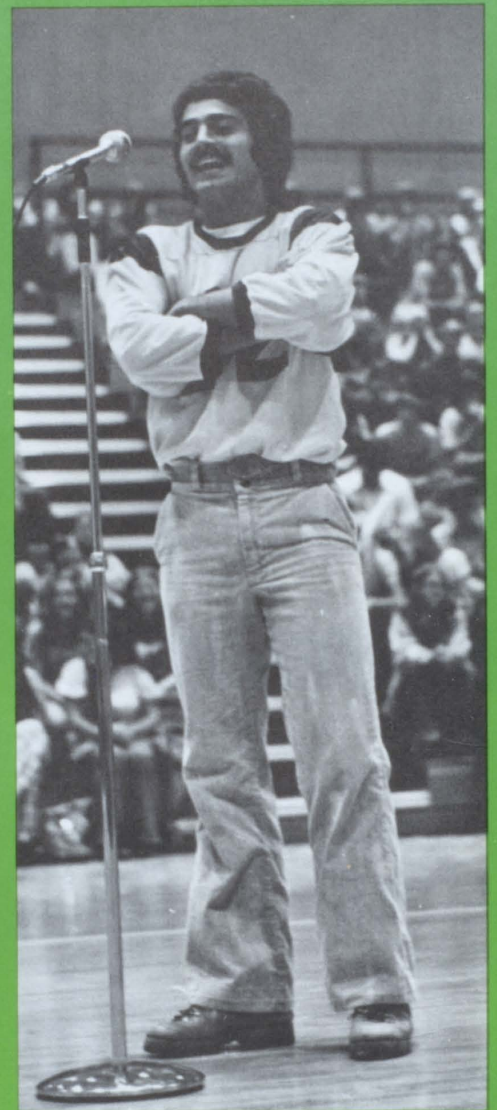
Although the football homecoming was followed by a pizza party in the school cafeteria, the dance planned for the basketball homecoming was cancelled due to student apathy.

"Special" days boost morales, build spirits

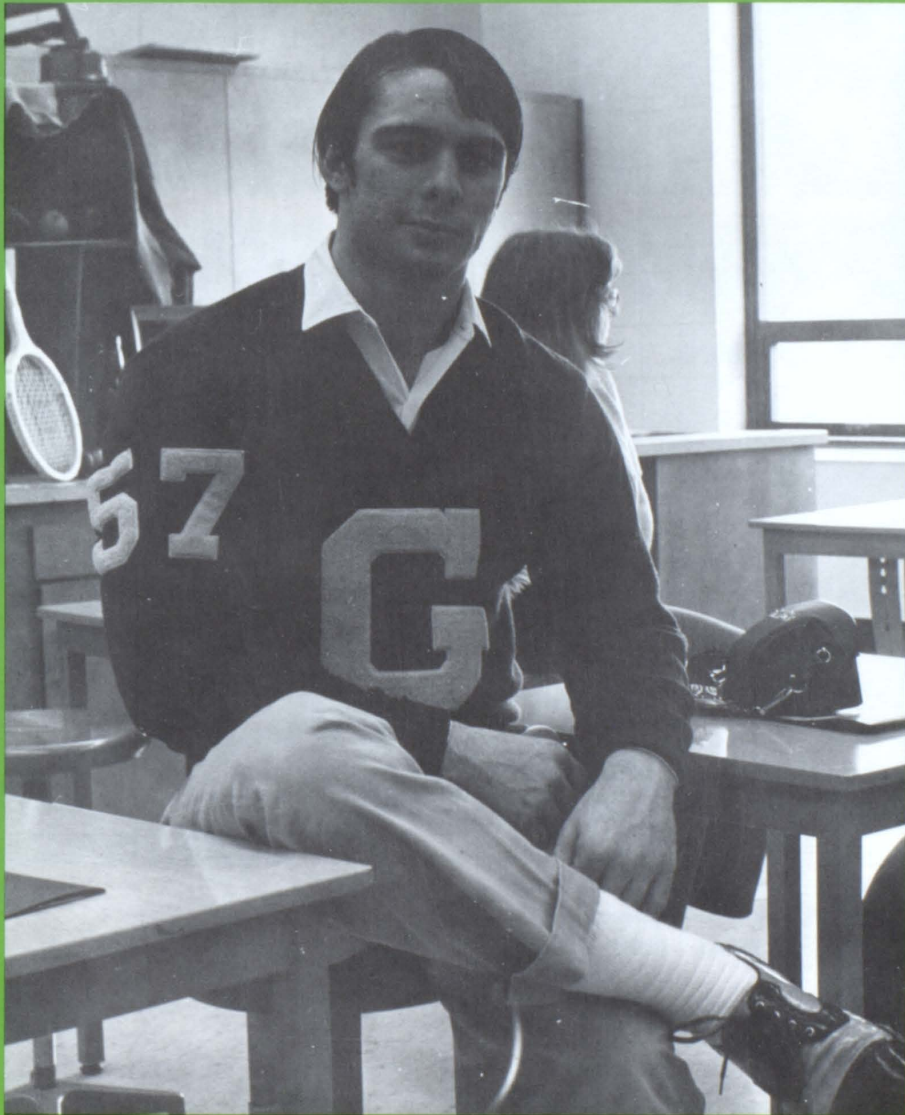

Band earns top honors

The month of June signalled the beginning of the Greenwood Marching Woodmen's most successful marching season ever. Under the direction of Mr. Herman Knoll, the band spent many exhaustive hours building a fine reputation for GCHS.

Rigorous drilling of fundamentals on balmy June evenings provided a solid basis for the month of August, when the band spent over 17,000 collective hours perfecting the State Fair show that awarded them a sixth-place finish August 21. Strains of "Once Upon a Time", the traditional "Somewhere Over the Rainbow", and the soon-to-become-familiar "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" and "In the Mood", answered the cheers of approximately 22,000 people, as the band marched under the spotlights.

The Marching Woodmen shared a half-time performance at Indiana State

University with the Martinsville Marching Artesian Band, and simultaneously began preparation for field competition at Southport. Using a special arrangement of Holst's "Suite in Eb", along with other tunes and some State Fair arrangements, the band first captured a First Division rating in Group I, going on to place fourth at the State March-Off two weeks later.

The band's outstanding season drew numerous other invitations to perform and/or compete. The group traveled to Morehead State University south of Lexington, Kentucky for an exclusive three-state marching contest. Competing against the finest bands of Kentucky, Ohio, and Indiana, the Marching Woodmen became the only out-of-state band to be honored, by capturing the fourth-place trophy.

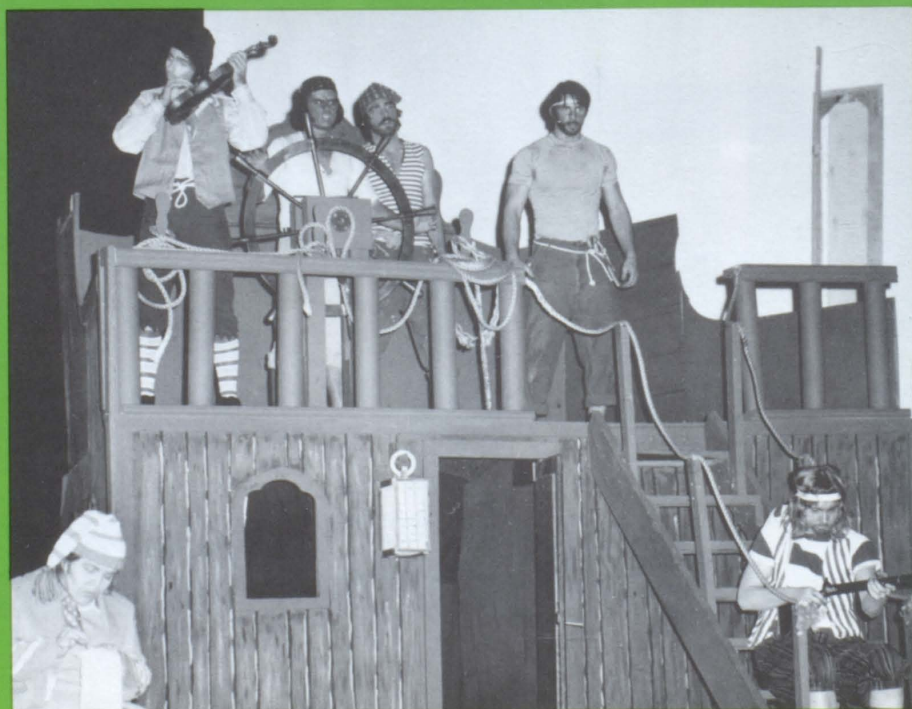
One of the most obvious of these situations was the problem of creating the illusion of "flying" actors. This was accomplished through the use of hidden harnesses, hundreds of feet of airplane cable, a skilled rigging crew, and long hours of practice by both the crew and actors.

After all technical, musical, and

acting problems were ironed out, mother nature stepped in to complicate matters with one of the heaviest snows of the year on opening day. Treacherous weather conditions forced the postponement of the production one day, changing the scheduled Friday night performance to a Sunday matinee.

Despite a few complications, a truly dedicated cast, crew, and orchestra combined forces to make "Peter Pan" one of the most successful musicals ever produced at GCHS.

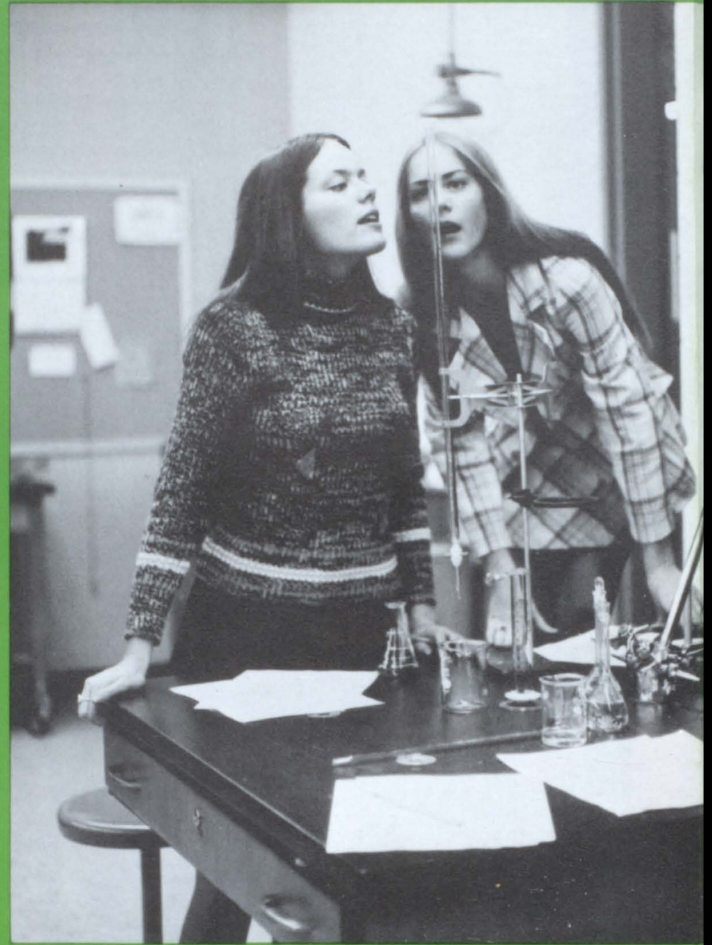
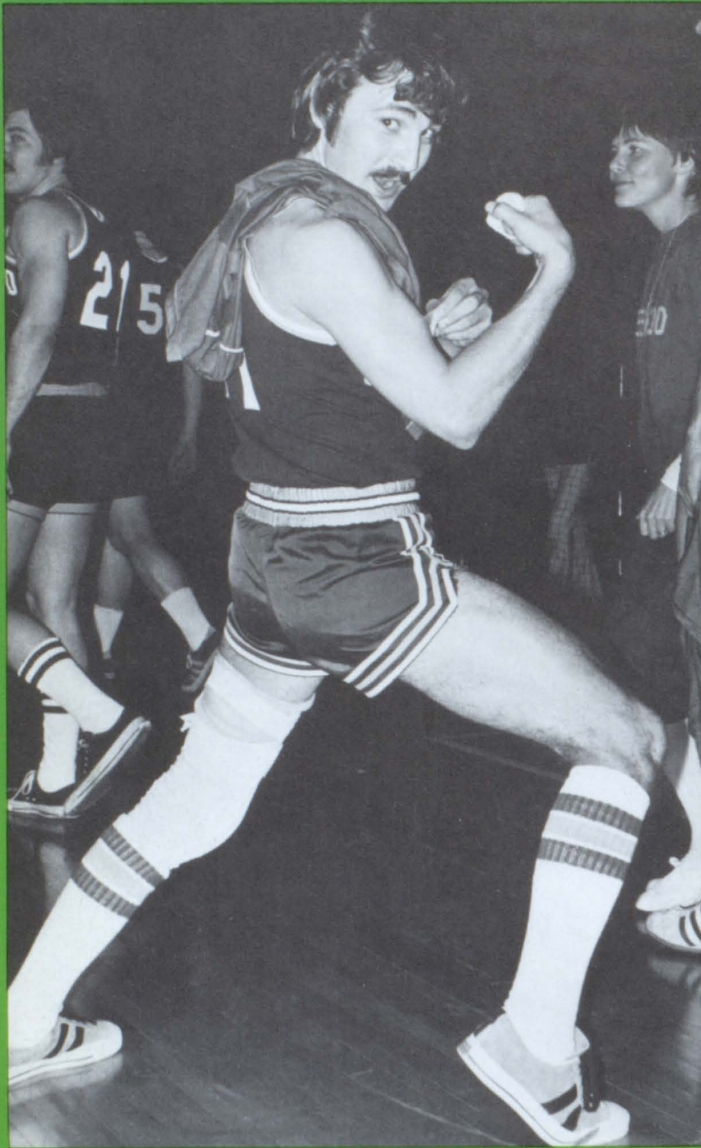

Tech Crew

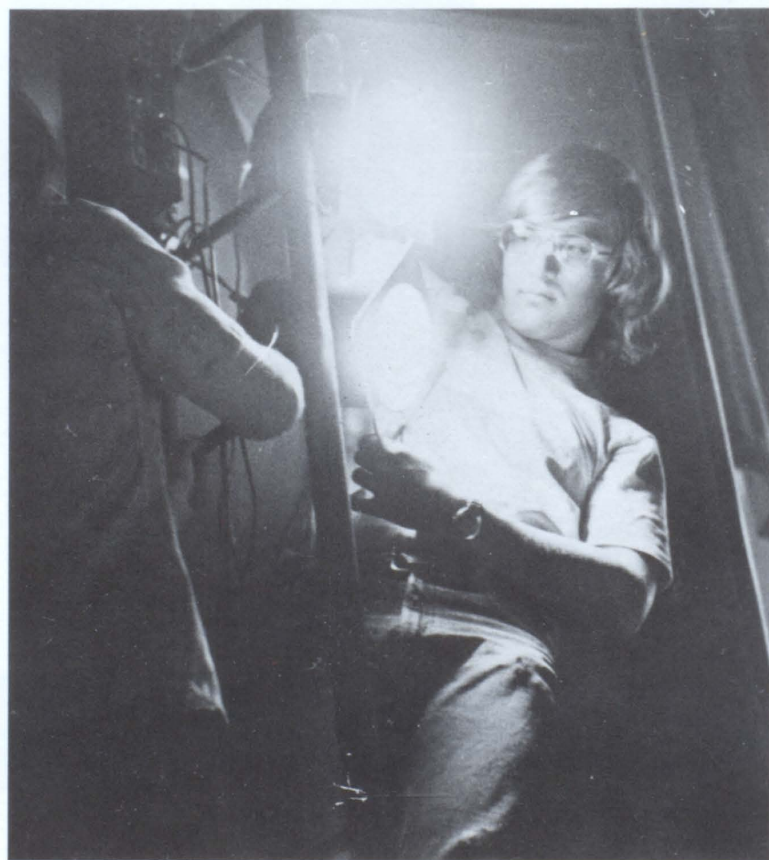

National Honor Society

The National Honor Society is a predominantly honorary society for exceptional high school seniors.

Membership to the society is determined mainly through scholastic achievement, character, activities, and leadership.

Scholastically, a student must maintain above a 90.0 average. He must excel in his activities, both in number and participation. These activities may include clubs, sports, music, theatre, and any honors or awards. A minimum of 5 activities is usually

enforced. The eligible applicants are rated on a character scale from 1 to 5, by the faculty. The students who received the highest ratings in all of these areas are then initiated.

Since members of NHS are usually involved in many other extracurricular activities, the society is usually considered honorary and activities are kept to a minimum or completely eliminated. This year, one of the main functions of the NHS was to provide tutoring services.

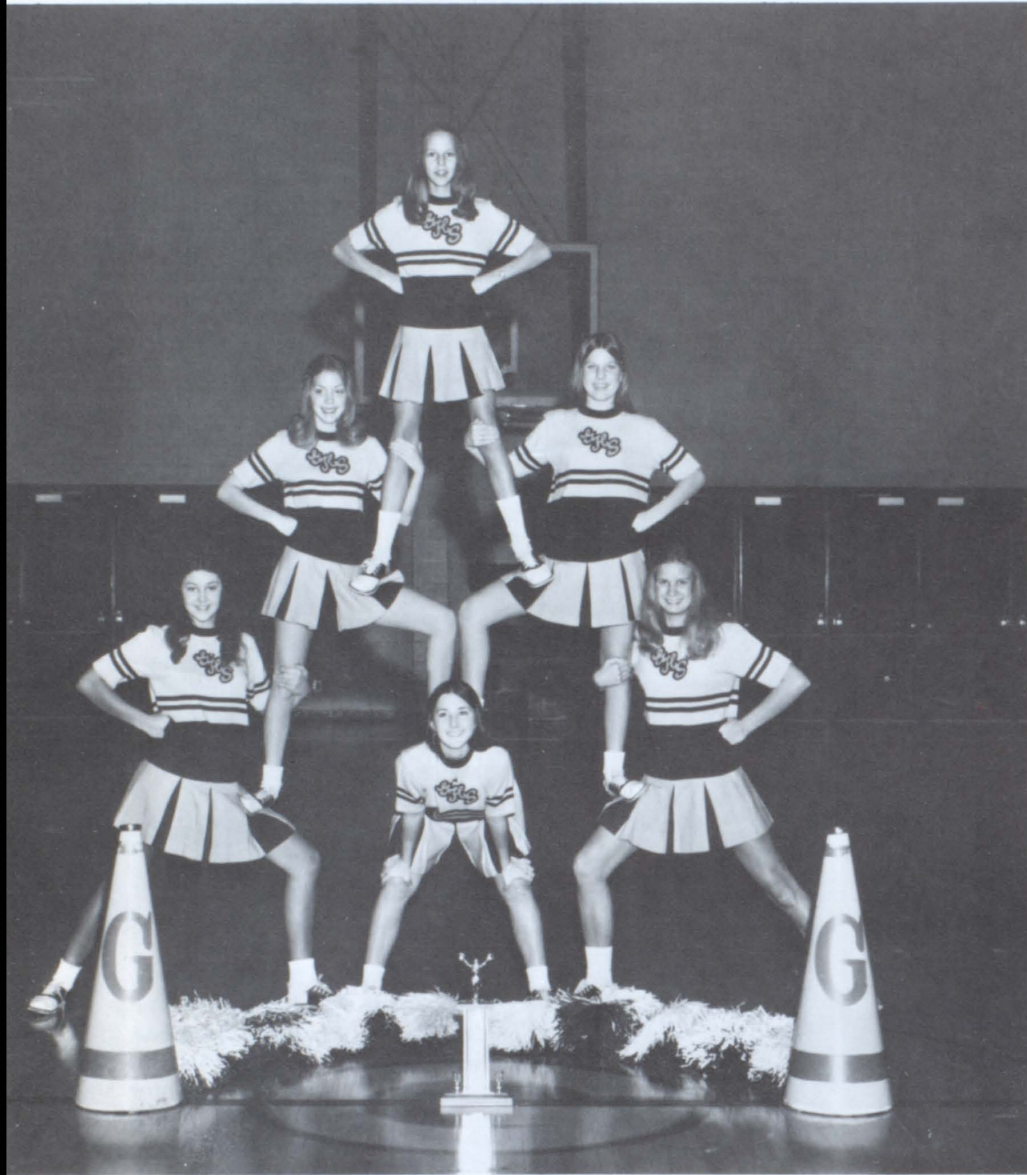

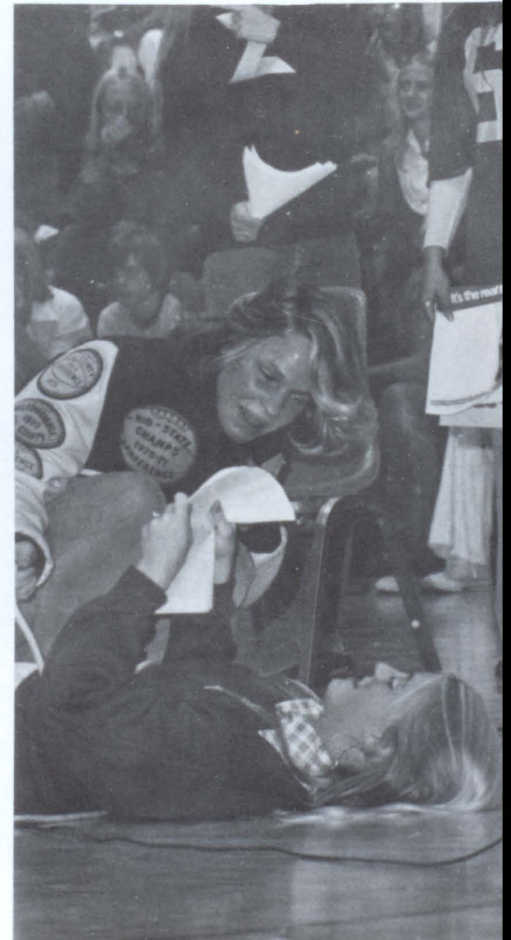
Organizing one of the most spirited student bodies in several years was a major task for all GCHS cheerleader squads this year.

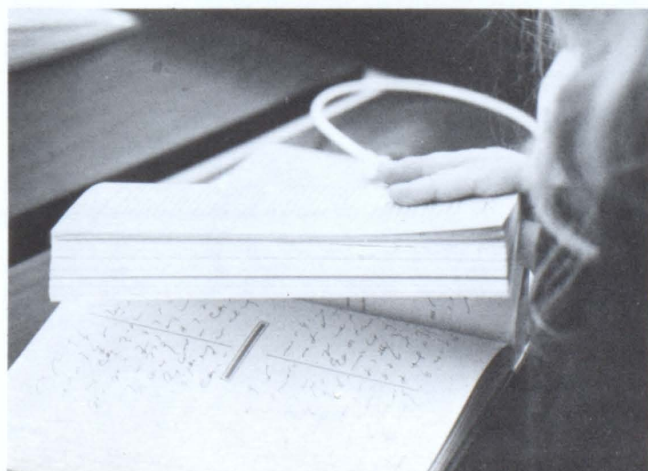


Business teaches practical skills

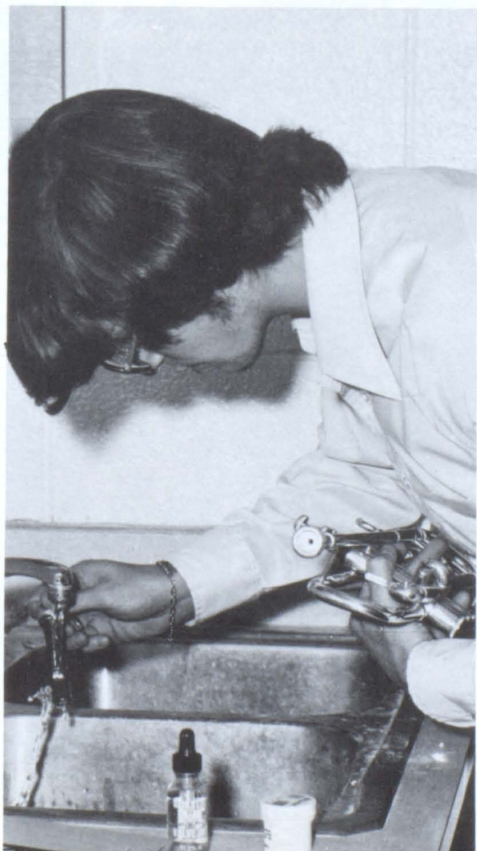

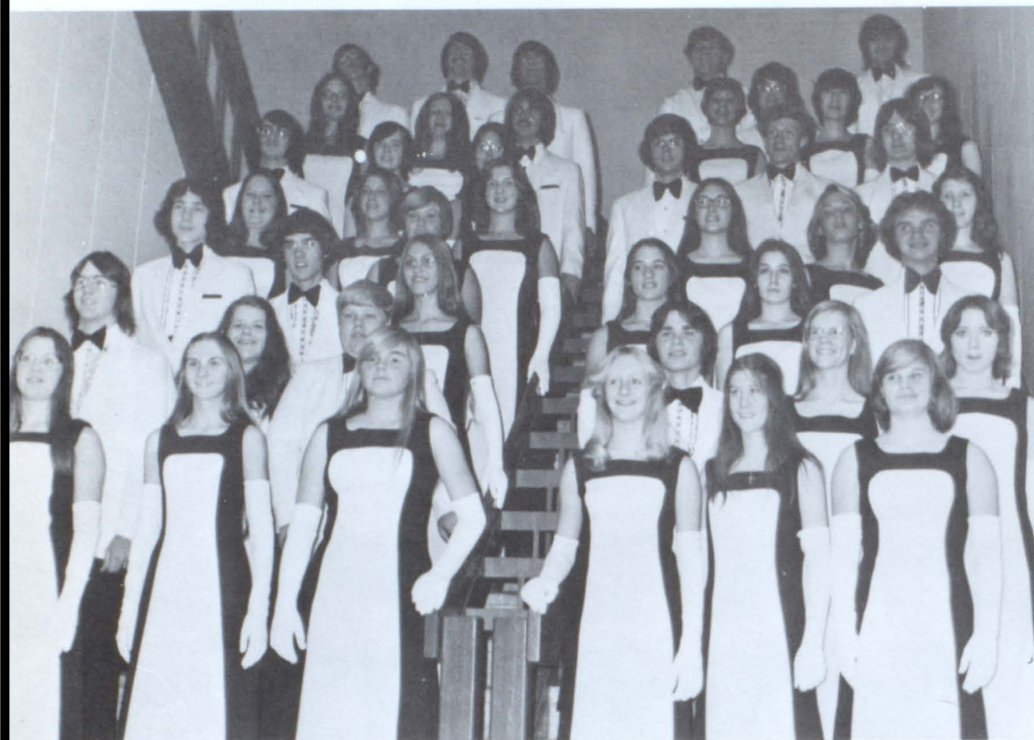

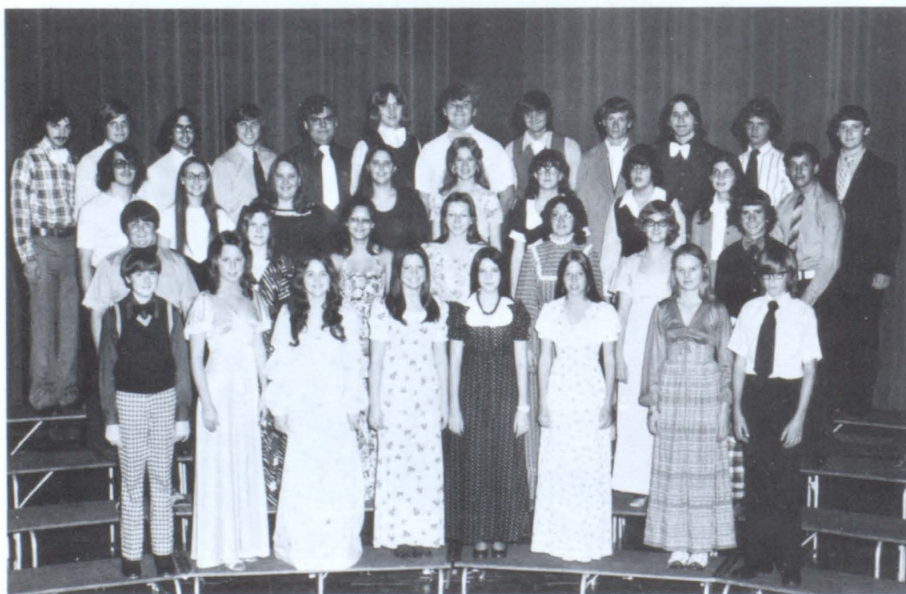
Throughout the year, Advanced Girls' Chorus gave special concerts to residents of Westminster Village.

'Godspell' shows creativity



Innovation, originality, and creativity proved to be the key ingredients in the production of GCHS first rock musical, "Godspell". The musical ended the 1974-75 season for the Department of Performing Arts.

Created by John-Michael Tebelak, "Godspell" is a modern interpretation of the Gospel according to Matthew. It creates an intimate atmosphere between the cast and audience which was enhanced by its performance in the bandroom. The design of this room provided a perfect thrust stage, which places the actors in the center of the audience, helping emotions and ideas flow easily from actor to audience without artificial expression.

"Godspell" has two universal themes: love and joy. It tells the story of Christ through modern devices

which may be easily changed without losing meaning. Each of the ten actors and the crew members created their own original interpretations of their aspects of the play and of the play as a whole. Each actor designed his own costume and make-up.

The crew converted the usual wire fence setting to a rickety wooden one, adapting the entire set to conform with an atmosphere of non-commercialism. They reduced all special effects as much as possible to place all emphasis of the play on the actors.

The combined result of these interpretations was a distinctively individual and original production of "Godspell" which was one of the most successful, impressive, and remembered productions ever at Greenwood.

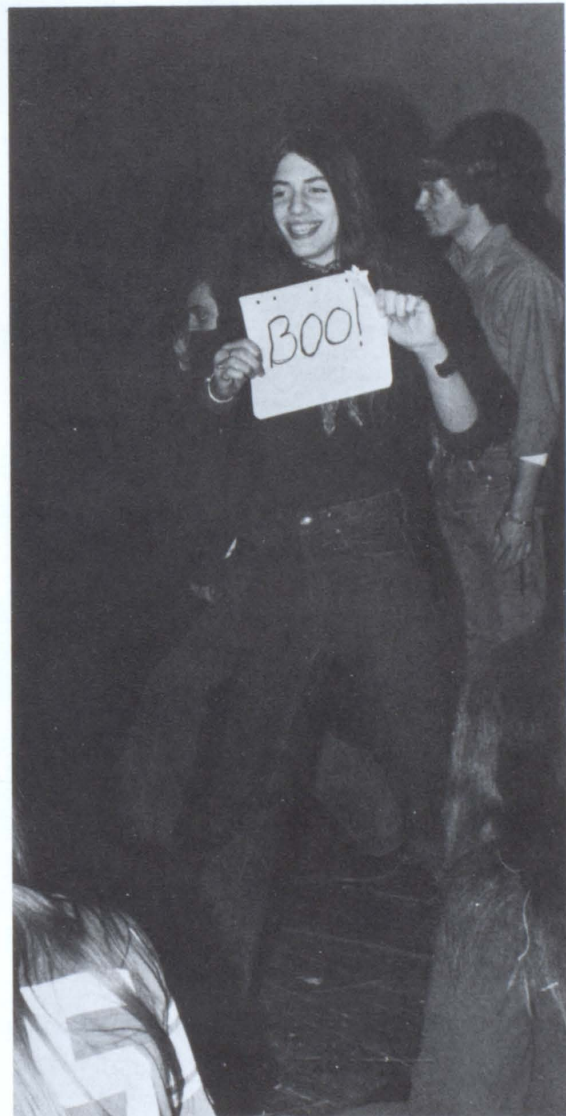

What's cooking?

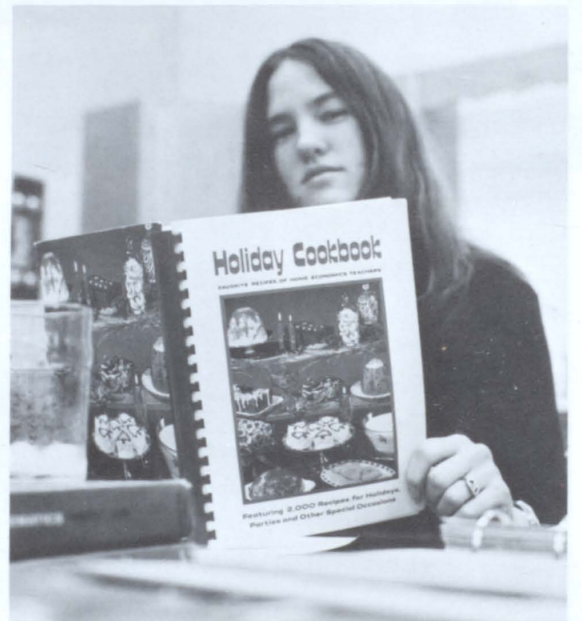
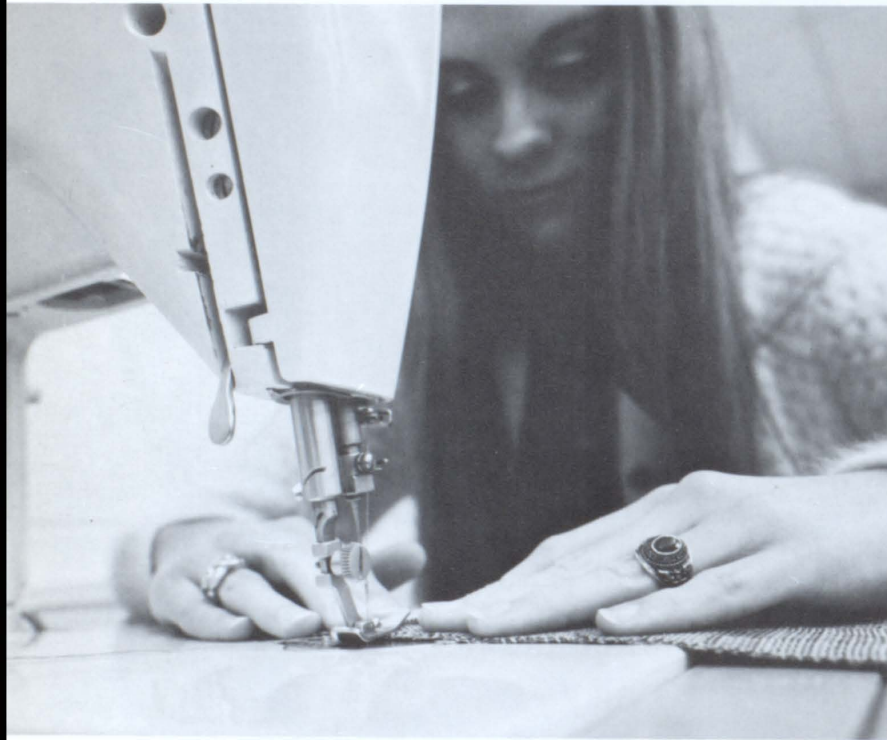

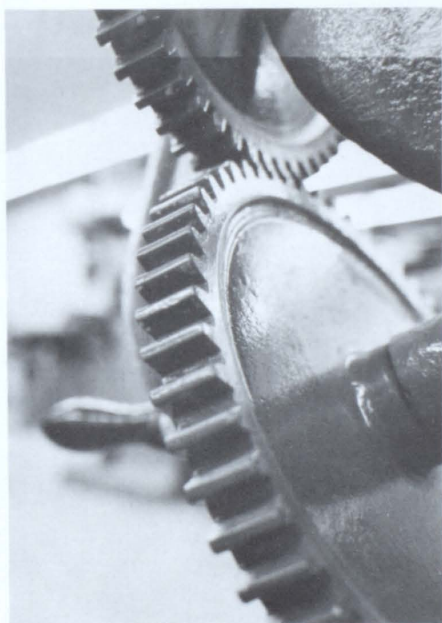
Career preparation in I-Arts



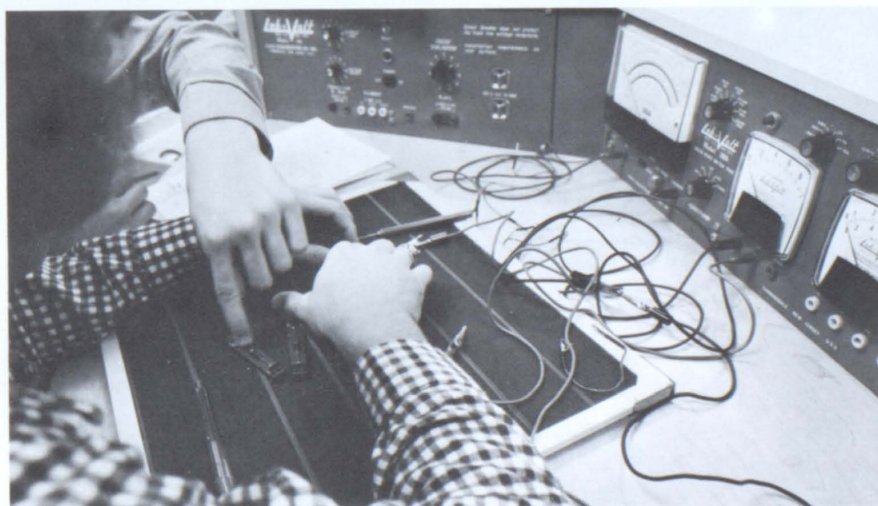

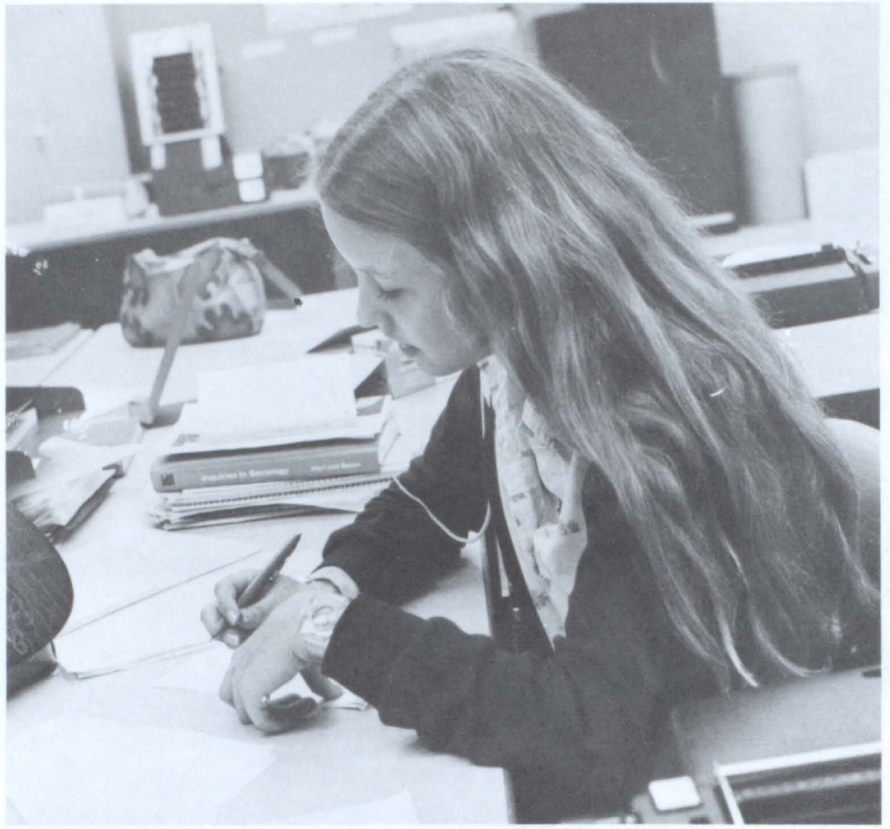


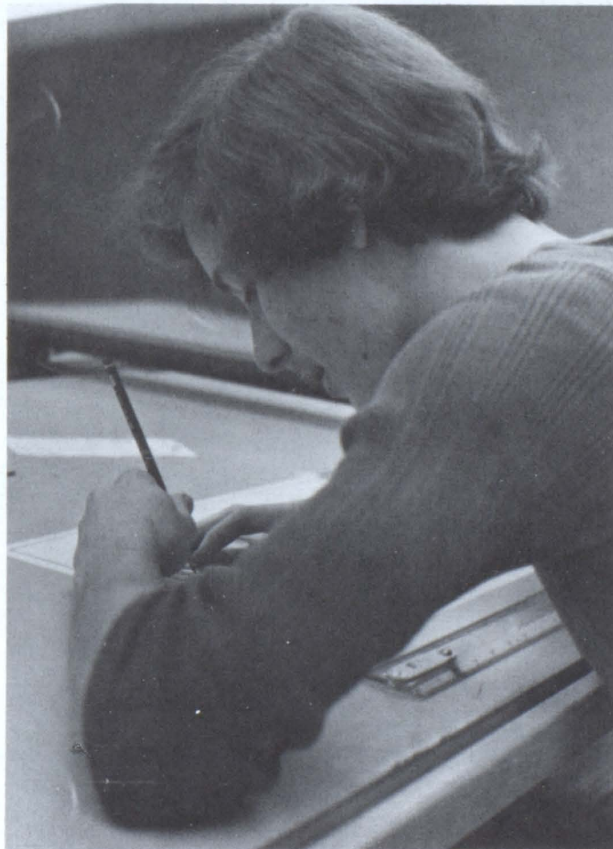
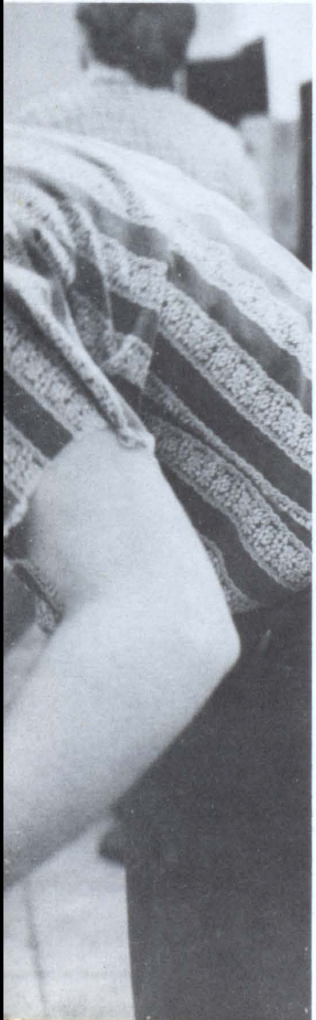
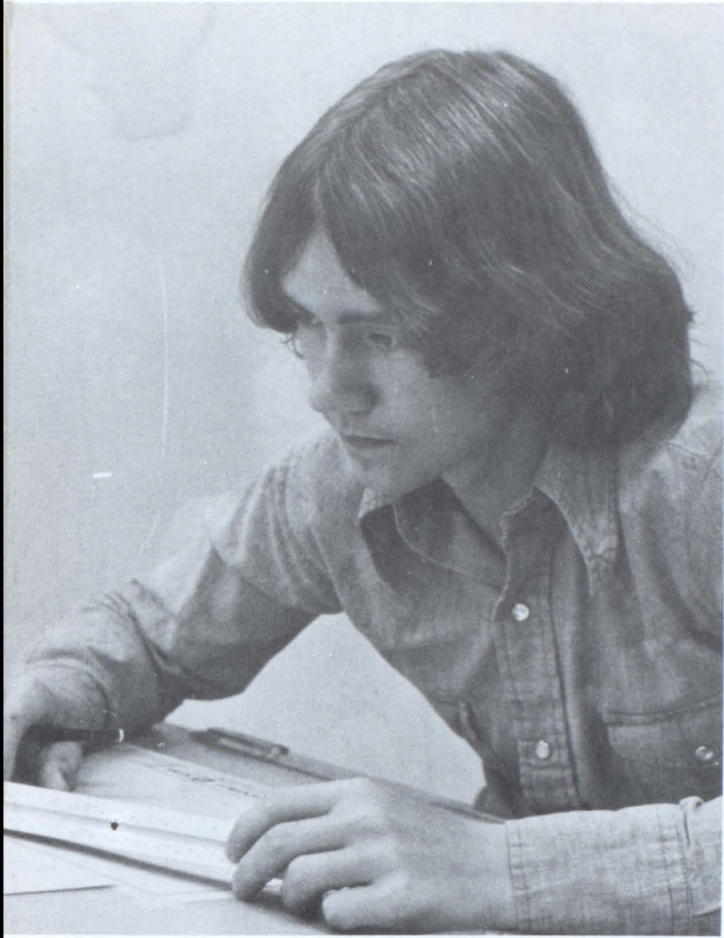
Vocational training offered at C-9

Juniors and seniors may enroll in either a two year or one year curriculum at C-9.





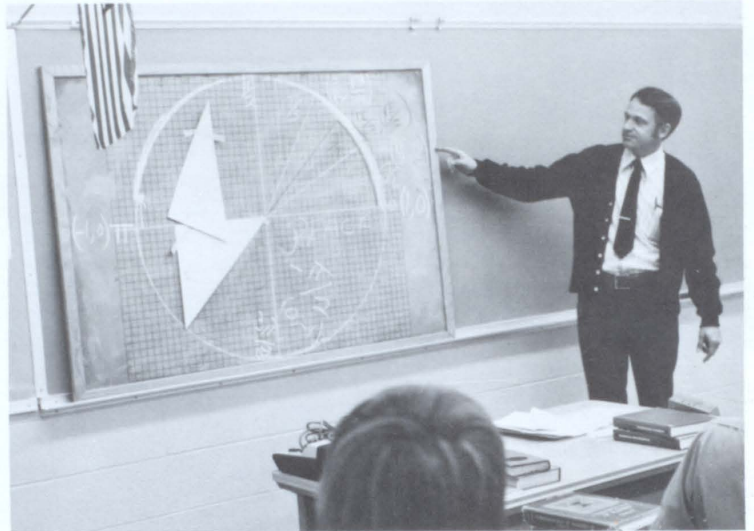
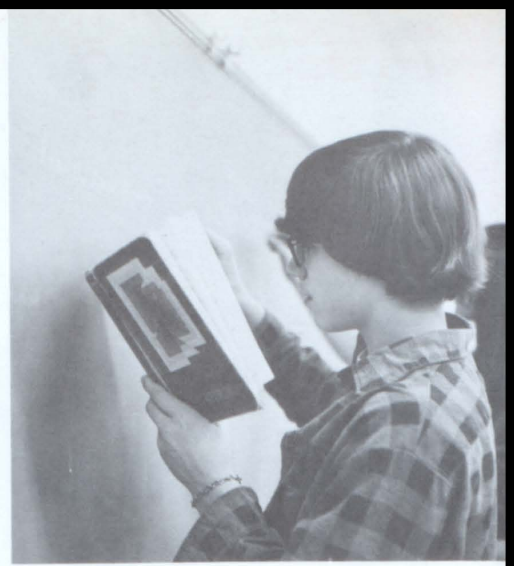

Various skills developed

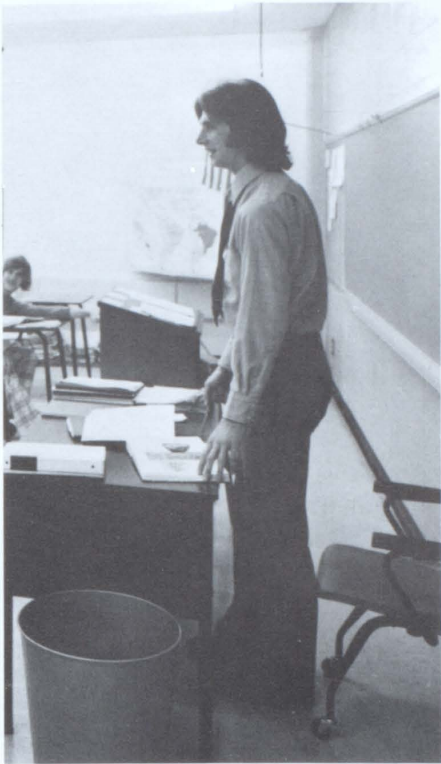

Emphasis in social science classes was placed on upholding our democracy and developing a strong feeling of the individual's importance as a citizen.

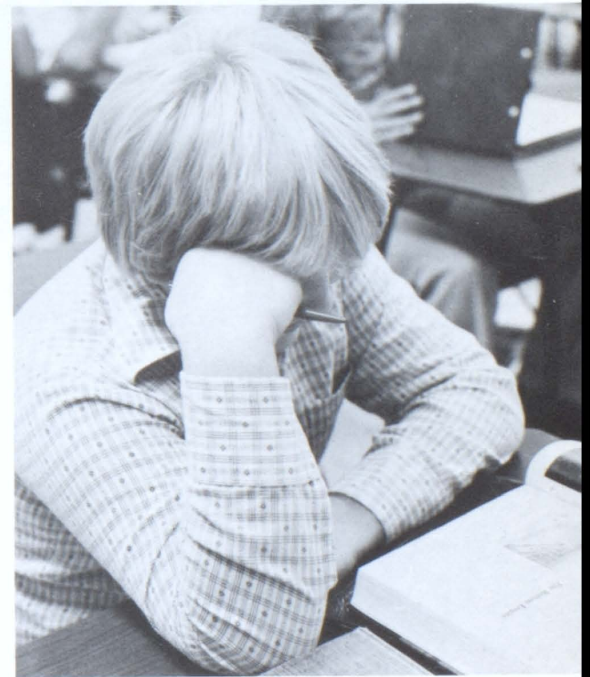

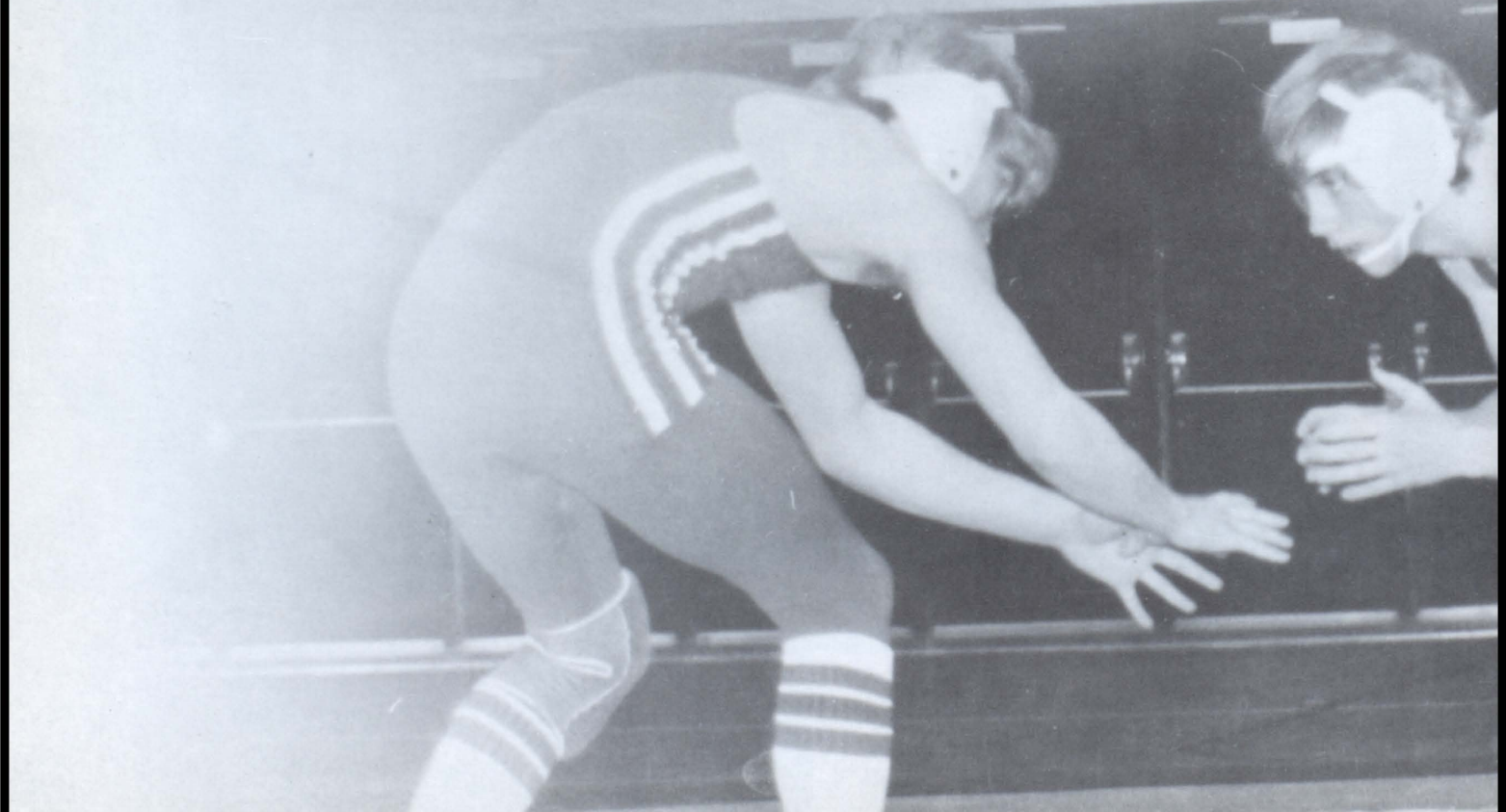
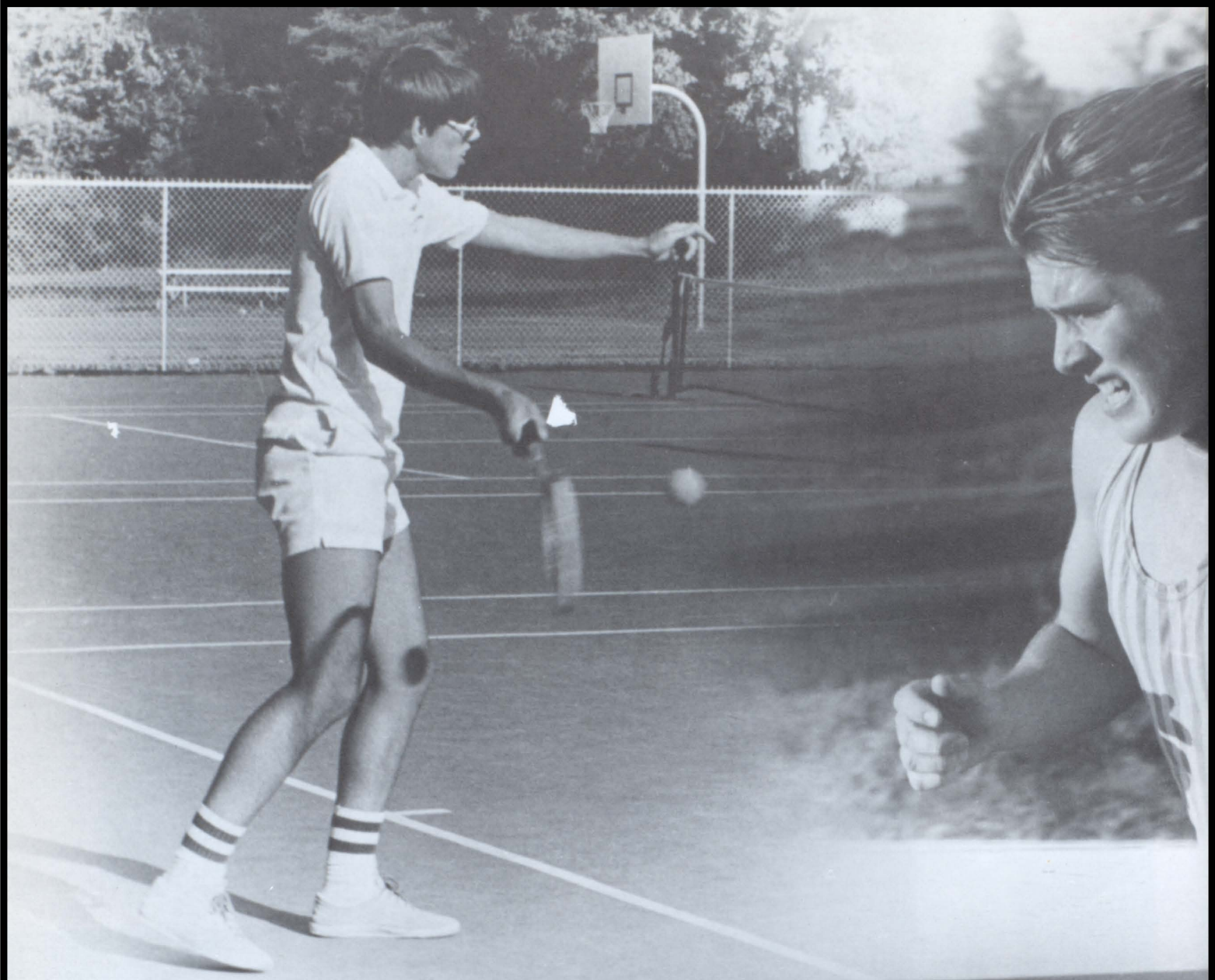

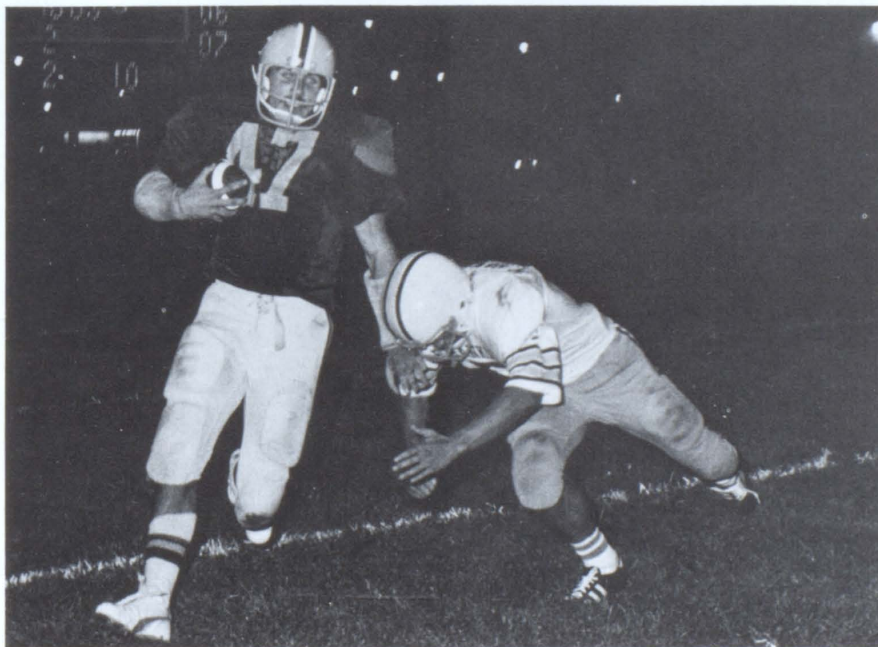
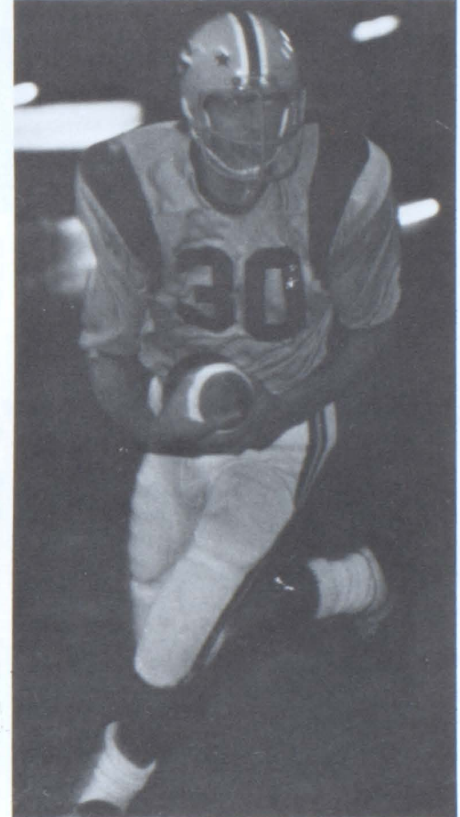
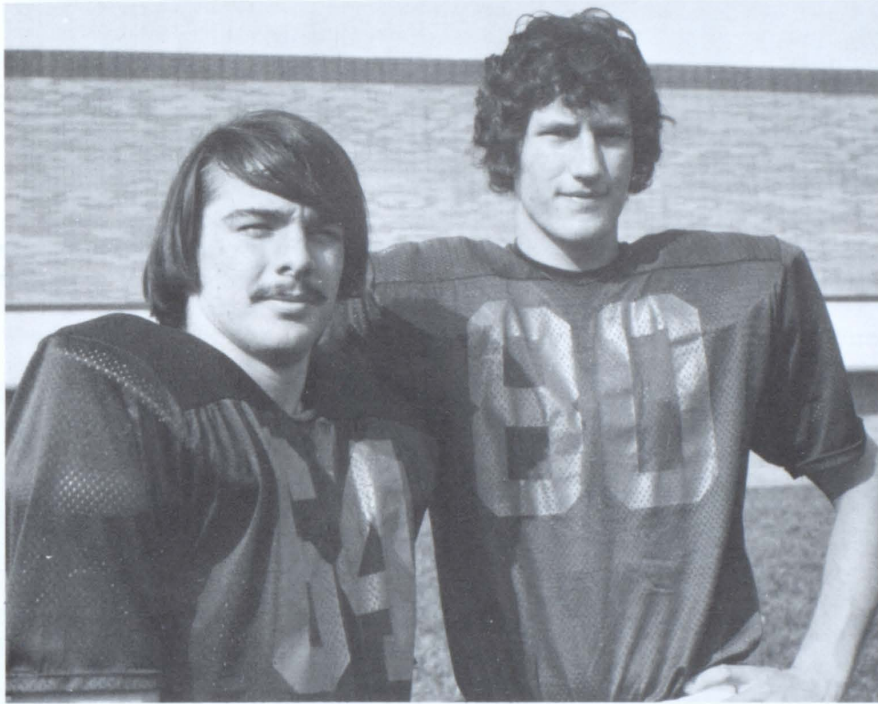
Blackburn was named recipient of the Mike Neely Award for the Most

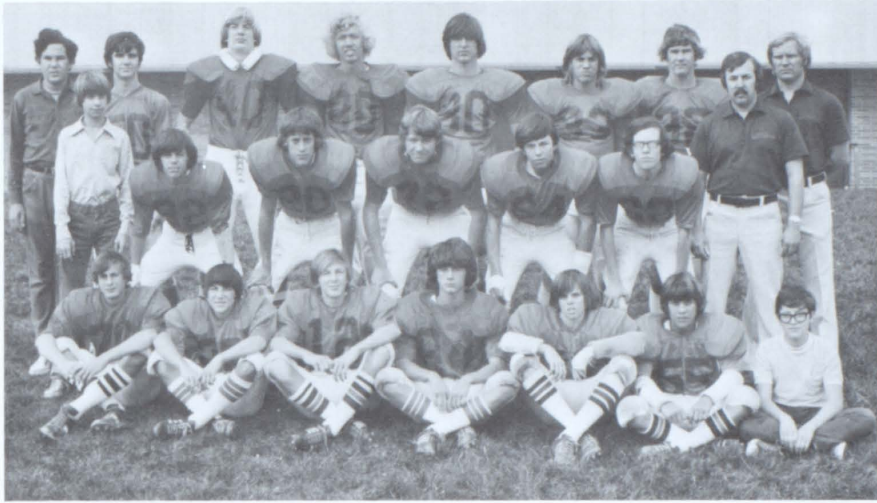

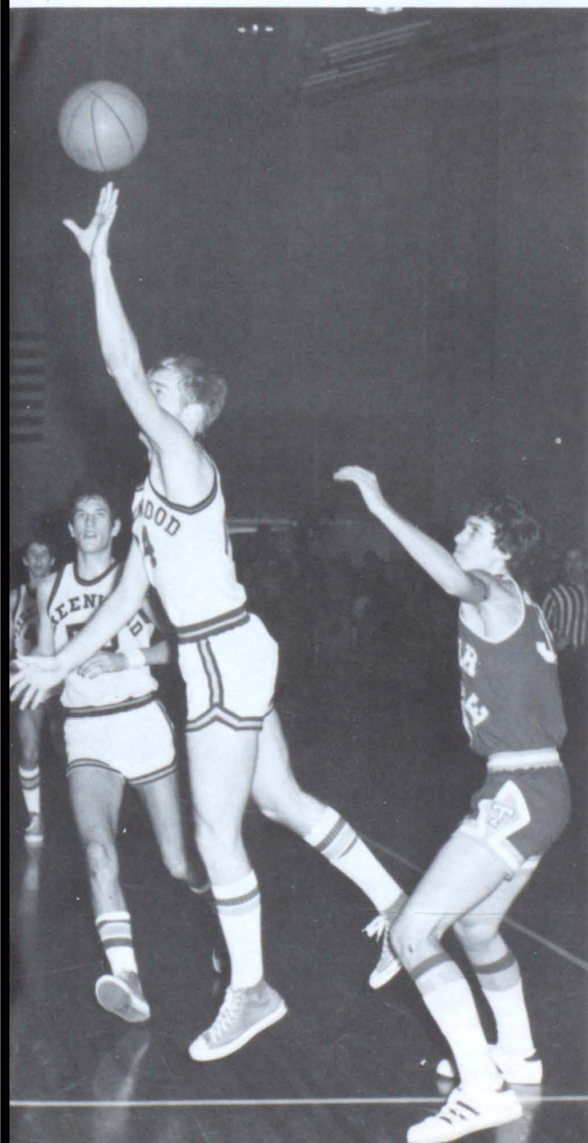

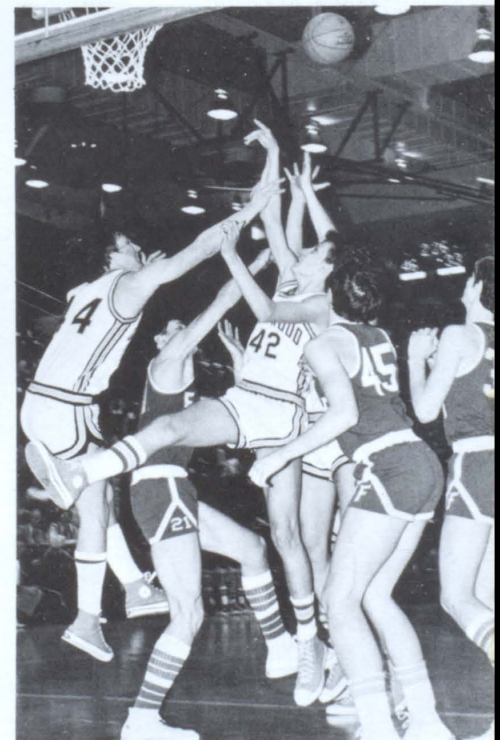
The Reserve basketball team, coached by first year coach Jerry Gurrado, finished the season with a 6-12 record, the best in the last six years.

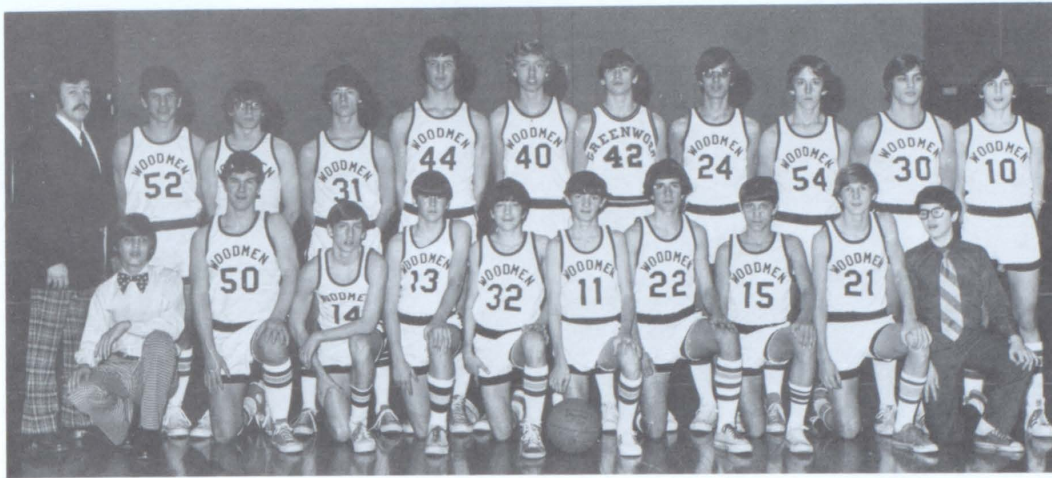

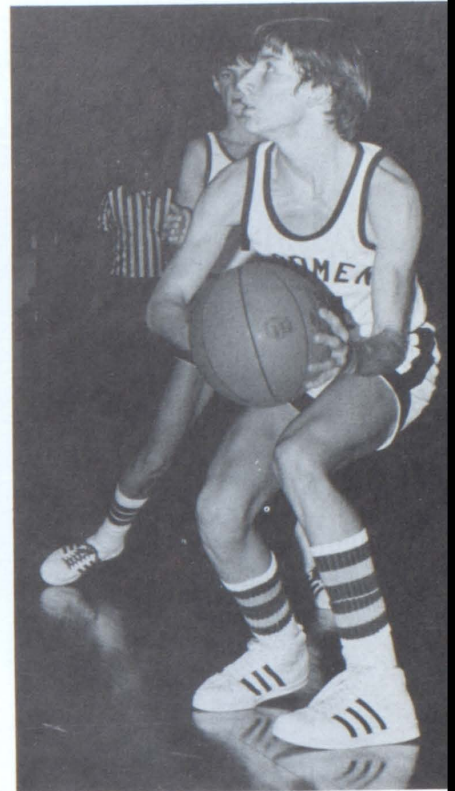

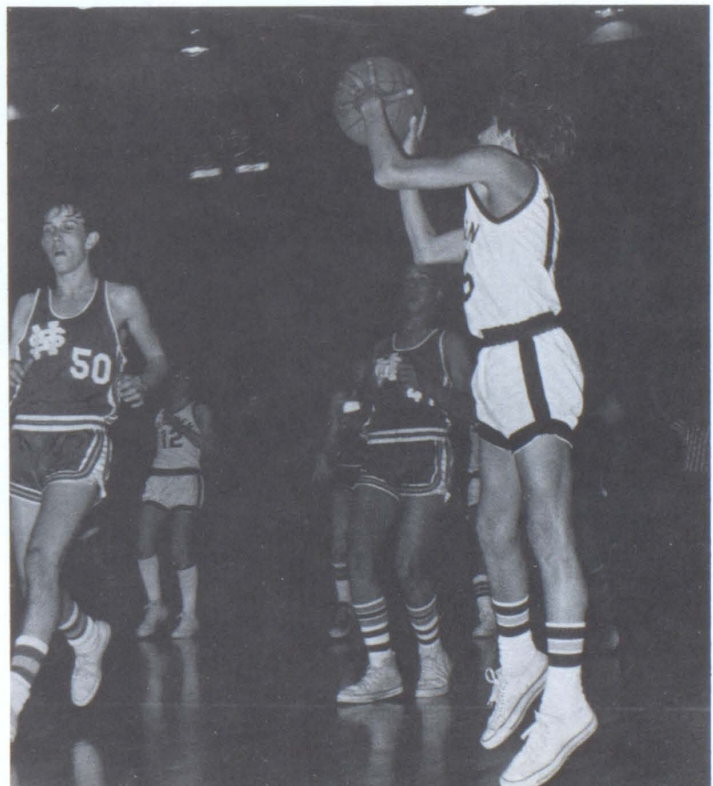

Clephane at 105 and Allen at 145 along with Jay Farmer at 98 and John Velez at 126 will be the nucleus of the 1975-76 team.

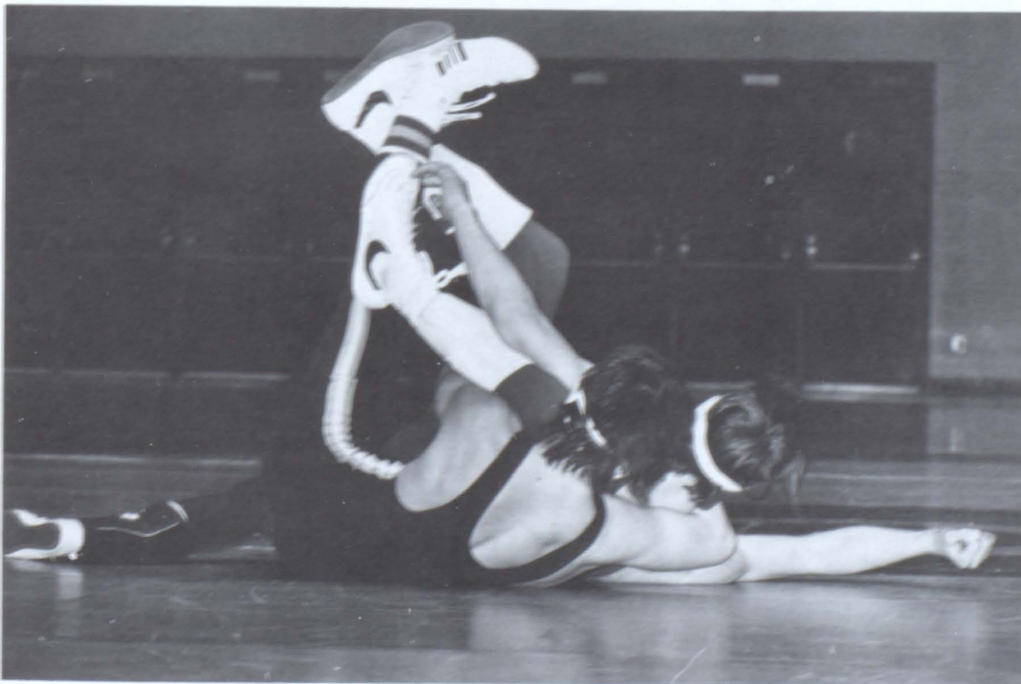
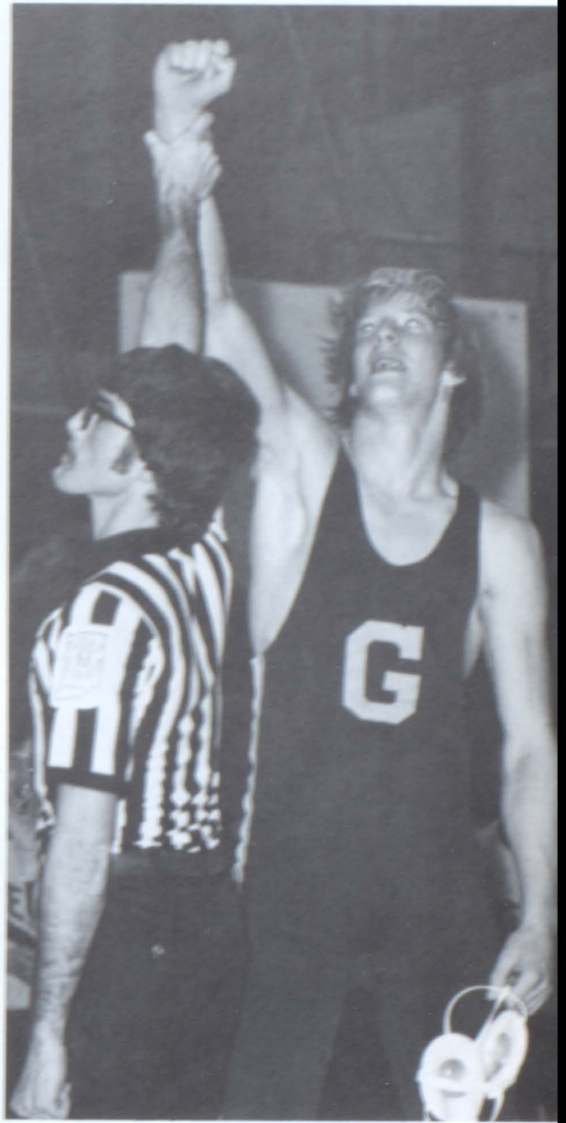
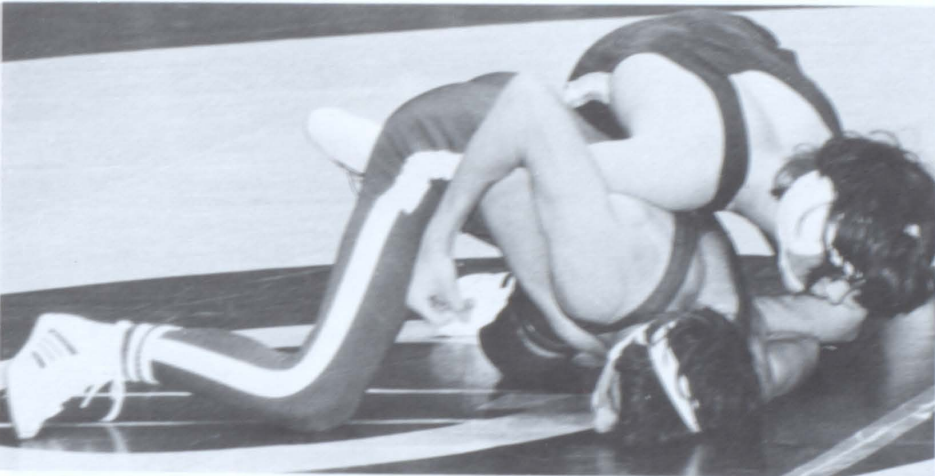
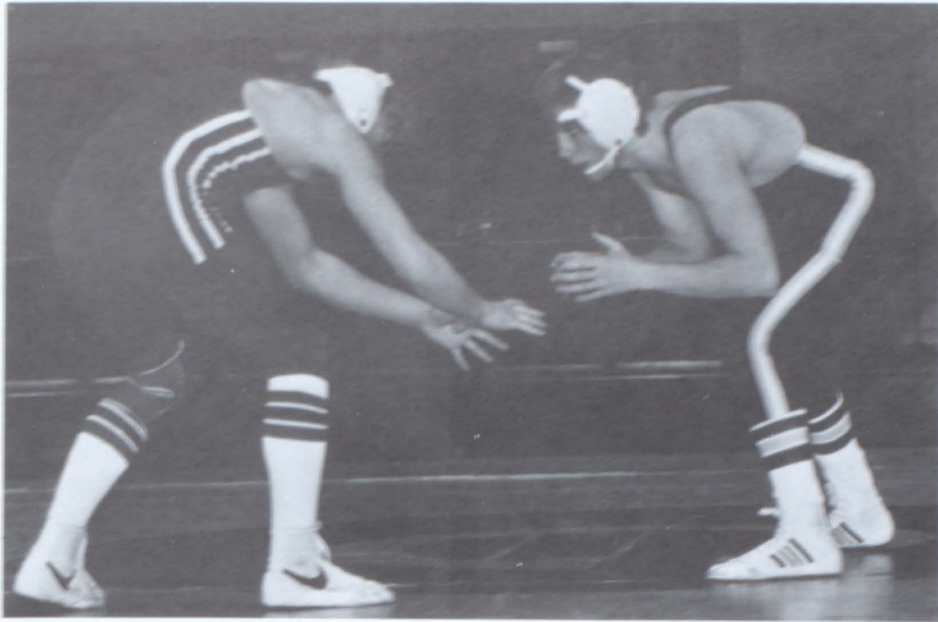

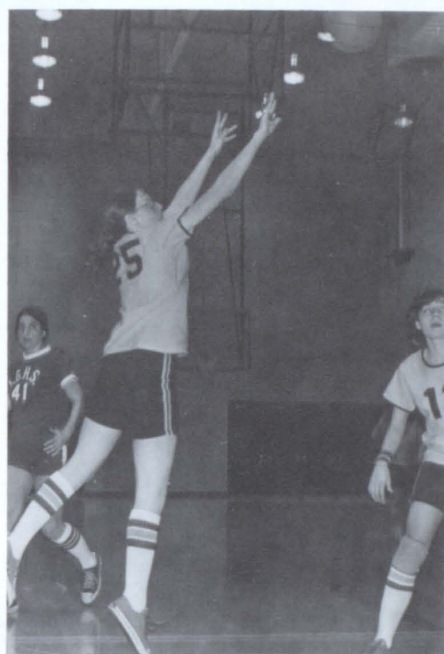

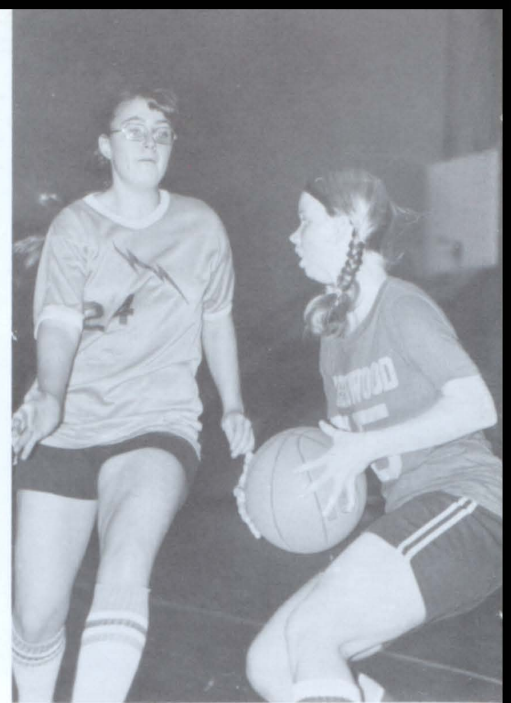

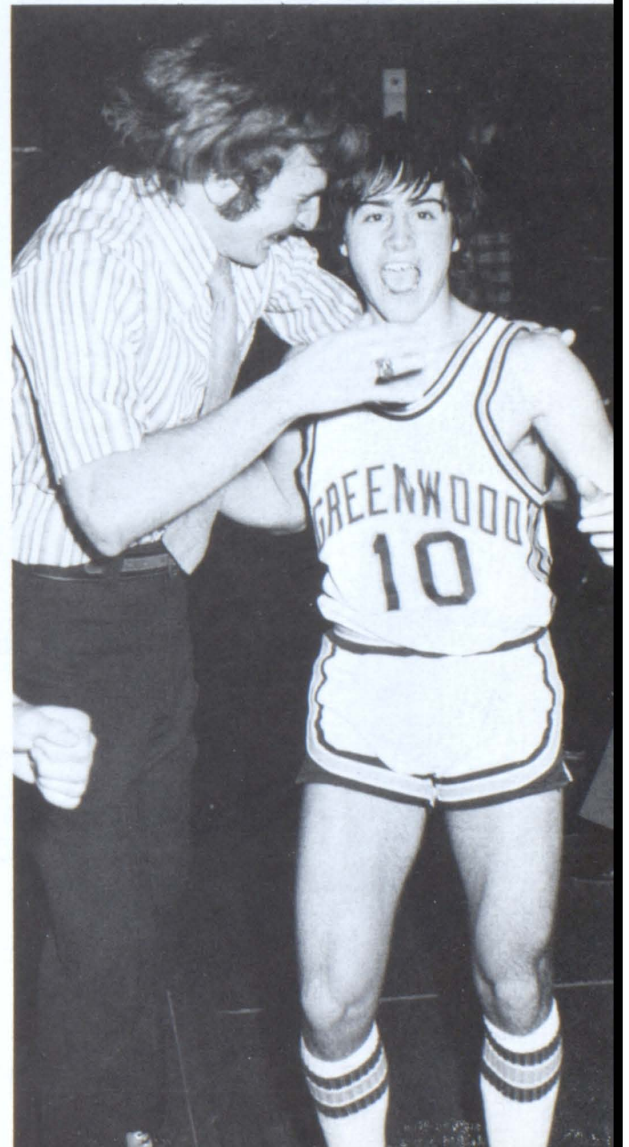


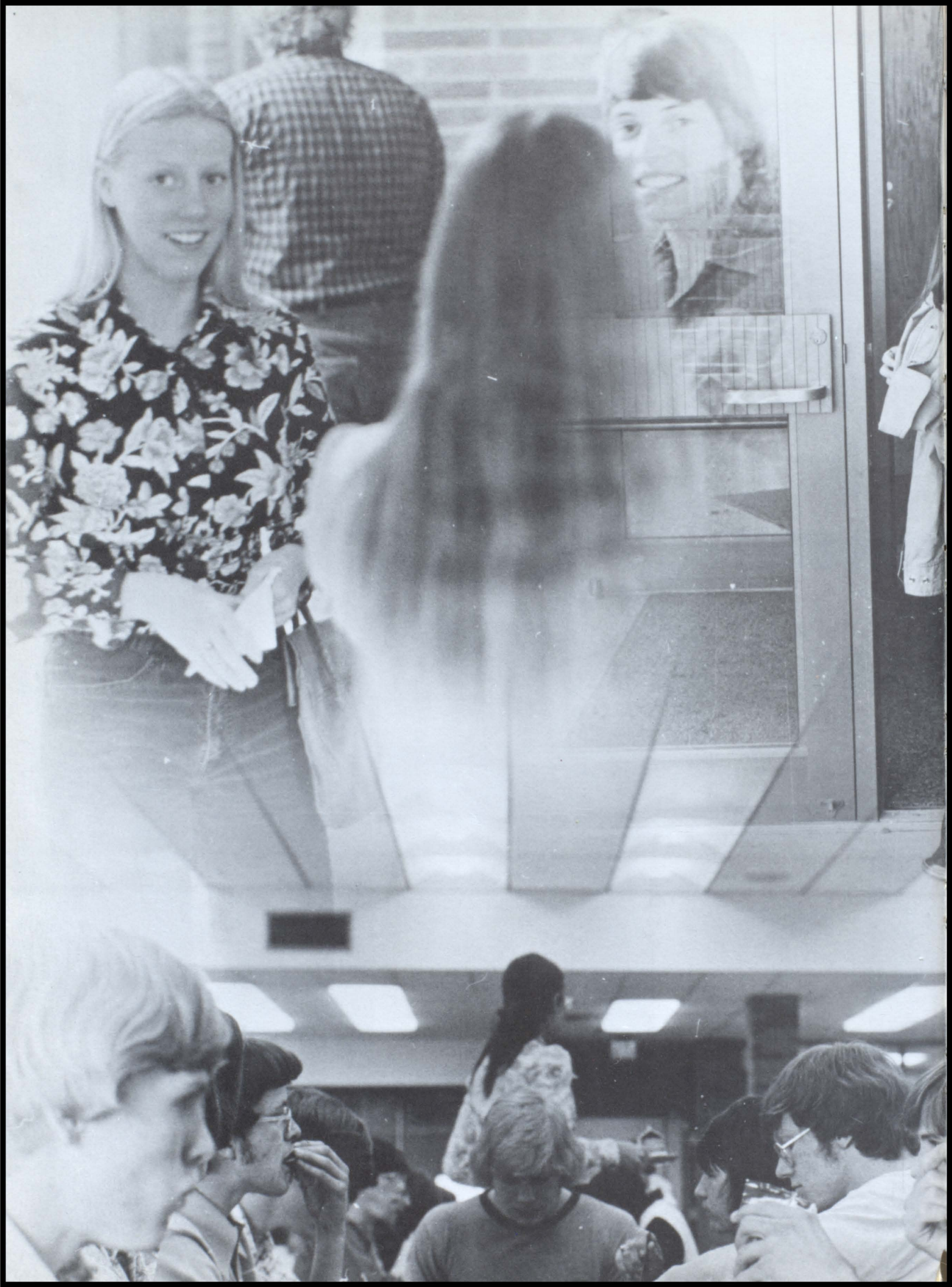

Prom sets new mood on Lafayette

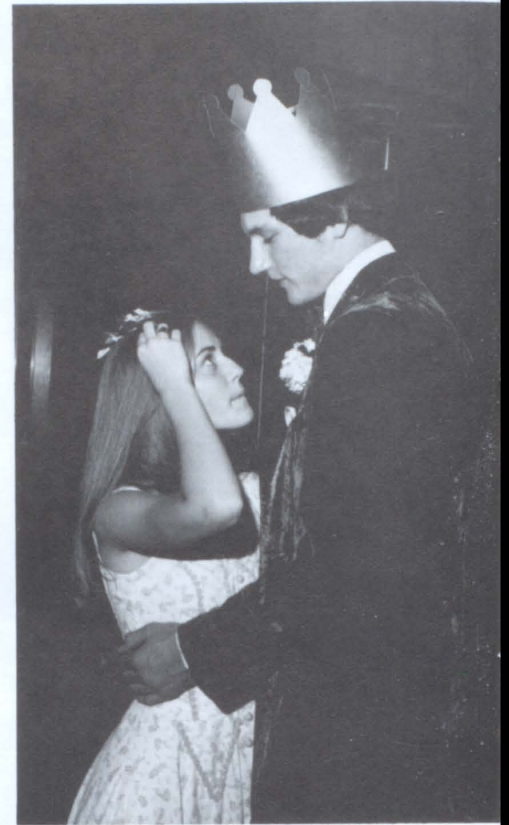



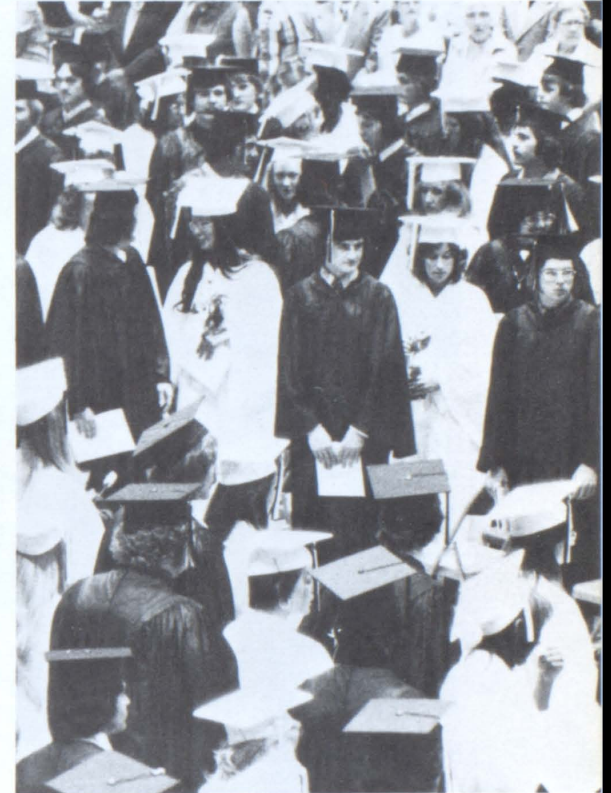

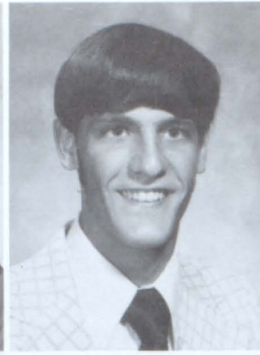
