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
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potentials

This year the second annual basketball homecoming was held. Although the Woodmen were defeated by the Perry Meridian Falcons, the festivities were exciting.


Homecoming week was set into motion with a week of unusual and spirit building class competitions.





A second evening of plays was a childrens play written by Mr. David McFadzean, theater director. 'Pene-












Activities


Student Council has Fun Night










Freshmen go undefeated 8-0-1

Franklin, Center Grove, and Indian Creek fell to the team as they finished second in the County, fourth in the Mid-State, and tenth in the Sectional.






Records fall





Physical Education gave students a break from the regular academic curriculum to develop physically. Basketball, volleyball, soccer, baseball, and field hockey are just a few activities.


Advanced P.E. is also offered. This co-ed class started the year with cave exploring, water skiing, bicycling, and roller skating. They also went into motorcycling and tennis.


Science disected


Math equals fun




World problems discussed

With the purpose of acquainting students with the past and present day problems of today's world, the Social Science department helps students prepare for life by making them aware of some of these problems.












English is ...


As graduation grew closer Seniors




By 9:00 p.m. Dr. Earl Blemker and Mr. Harold Crawford had conferred diplomas and the future began.


Representing the class on the Student Council were Becky Burge, Diane Mitchell, Cindy Carson, John Beckley, and Julie Cardwell.

Penny Fish attempts to work on the balance beam in physical education. Part of freshman physical education is gymnastics.









The Freshmen experienced their first float building using the theme, "Quakers have a hang up".








Central Office hums

It takes more to run a high school than meets the eye. Because of the office personnel in the main office students can take full advantage of the educational facilities.


Responsible for GCHS is Mr. Harold Crawford, principal. His administrative duties include building and maintenance activities as well as personnel.

Handling student problem and discipline is Mr. Leonard Scotten. He also helps set up special student programs such as intramurals to enrich the offerings of the school.


Mrs. Virginia Stretchberry and Mrs. Peggy Dillon, with the help of student office workers, take care of all secretarial and record keeping duties.



What was considered a landmark in Greenwood was razed in July—V.O. Isom Central Elementary School. Built in 1901, the building has withstood many years of constant use and watched as thousands of Greenwood students passed through the halls. The new Isom Central building will be opened in the fall, but it will not be quite the same as the old towering brick building that held so many memories.

In 1864 the first elementary school was erected at Meridian and Vroadway Streets. The frame structure had two rooms and was replaced in 1865 by a brick building at Meridian and Wiley. Two fires took away school facilities from the community. Additions were made to the buildings to house more students and athletics. Students from I-12 attended the same school.

Mr. V. O. Isom, named principal of Central Elementary, was instrumental in the changes in the school. It was named in his honor in 1965 after his death.
