For the Senior Class of 1983, we leave you with this thought: What appears to be the end may really be a new beginning!












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
Clowns entertain

'Spoon River' presents life's loom

"Life all around me here in the village:

Tragedy, comedy, valor and truth, Courage, constancy, heroism, failure—

All in the loom, and oh what patterns!"

This is the theme of poet Edgar Lee Masters' Pulitzer Prize winning collection of poetry, "Spoon River Anthology". Presented in March, this play brought the audience close to the action by seating them on stage with the actors. After the play, the audience joined the cast for pie, drinks and conversation about the show

Via musical interludes, the audience was introuduced to the ghosts of those who inhabited Spoon River, and to those secrets that have gone with them to the grave. There were 60-odd characterizations and vignettes, offering an amazingly varied array of roles and impersonations, from the young lovers and preachers and teachers, to the funny chronicle of the poor-mixed-up Jew who ends up in the wrong cemetery. Both the sordid and the humorous sides of life are portrayed, with fetching ballads and the free verse form of Masters.





















Marching season exciting












Thespians break traditional schedule

Netters win triple crown


The '82 season was a pinnacle for the Woodmen Netmen. It was the first time ever for the Woodmen to capture a sectional title by beating rival Center Grove. That victory also gave Greenwood the first Triple Crown—a sweep of the Mid—State Conference, Johnson County, and Sectional titles.

To go with this, the Netmen posted a strong 15-7 season record, earning them 25th spot in the state rankings. Coach Gerry Steinhagen attributes the losses to a very tough schedule. Four of the seven losses were to teams ranked in the top 10 in the state, two of which were ranked number one.

The number one team in the state (Brebeuf) was to be Greenwood's opponent in the Netmen's first regional bid. Kent made his way into the final four by winning probably the sweetest match of his career by beating his nemesis Grayham Rogers of Park Tudor 6-3, 3-6, 7-6. That win avenged two previous losses to Rogers. Kent made his way into the final match, one step closer than the year before, but it wasn't quite enough as he lost in the finals to Paul Koscielski of South Bend Adams. It was the second time for the two to meet in a State Tournament.






















Reserves thrill crowds




Swimmers rebuild






Dhondt leads grapplers to 10-6


























Matmen pin 4-4 record


















Spikers win County title





The reserve and freshmen volleyball teams enjoyed winning seasons this year. The freshmen record ended up 9-4 and the reserve ended with 12-7.







Swimmers set, break records





and gaining experience.





























Reserves serve-up 11-1 record


