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




A memory is a feeling, a touch, a smile, a tear. A warm memory is a treasured moment stored away in the heart and recalled with joy, love and laughter.



Also held during the rally was an apple eating contest, won by the Sophomores, and the tug-owar, won by the Seniors.




Stu Rowe, an employee at The Athlete's Foot in the mall, said that he worked in order to have extra money for gas and entertainment.

Whether working simply for something to do or providing a means to take a date out on the weekend, the students at Greenwood High School spend a lot of their spare time working a part time job.




















Spirits soar at Homecoming

The 1983-84 school year was one of change for the Key Club. For the first time, the Key Club was almost 50% girls. There had been girls in the club before, but never as many as this past year.








Woodmen learn basics






The Varsity Volleyball team had a victorious season as they finished with a season record of 10-7. Their Mid-State record was 3-4.





The two bright spots for the Woodmen were returning lettermen Jeff Smith and Kent Kinnear. These two players received many honors.






The Varsity Wrestling team finished the season with disappointing 6-9 record.






Inexperience plagues girls

Pitching was led by Williams with a 5-5 record and an ERA of 2.64. Woodcock followed with a 2-0 record and an ERA of 4.10.










Revue Goes West





The students in the computer math classes are now able to sue computers on a one-to-one basis every other day. There are also


several business classes that use the computers at various times during the year.


These were just a few of the basic concepts of first year business classes. These and many more were carried on to the more advanced level courses.






Many new courses were introduced to GCHS students during the 1983-84 school year. Among those offered to math students were new and updated computer courses and Calculus as a college credit.


Because of the growing need for the use of computers, an updated computer math course was taught by Mr. William Mellencamp, head of the Math department, and Mr. William Hurt.

Calculus was offered to students as usual, but with an added advantage of college credit. Mr. William McFerran taught the class in association with Indiana University.




Social Science examines world around us
















Artists win Scholastic Gold Keys


