












































Jobs, jobs














Wonderland of snow



Dukakis spoke to the prom-goers on drunkdriving then stepped out onto the dance floor to join in a few dances.






Vodoo dance














AS TIME GOES ON

As you grew older, you realized it wasn't so dumb,


Actually you started having alot of great fun. But now it's over, my how time flies. Now where do you go, should you go for the sky?




Woodmen defend title




GCHS Science Department covers the world and outer space with its forces and discoveries. Science has a way of explaining those things that may seem unexplainable.

















Computers

Fitness mattered in health and physical education classes. Students not only learned the basics about good health and hygiene, they also had a chance to teach others through the advanced physical education classes adult fitnes program.

In the beginning physical education classes, emphasis was on being fit through athletic activities. These activities ranged from basketball, volleyball, and track to archery, gymnastics, and dance. Skills and rules of the games were taught in these classes.

The advanced physical education classes spent time with lifetime activity skills. Students learned safety for motorcycles, lifesaving techniques in swimming, and took a trip to a cave. They learned to teach games as well as play them.

Part of the fitness training was to work with adult volunteers in the community. After testing the adults and determining their fitness levels, students worked out a program of fitness and daily worked with the adults. Students and community members could be seen jogging around the grounds or swimming in the pool as part of the training.

Health classes gained a basic understanding of how the human body works. Emphasis was placed on recognizing danger signs for various illnesses. Students got a first hand look at the dangers of smoking and drug and alcohol abuse. The Greenwood Fire Department demonstrated fire safety and lifesaving techniques.



Home working

Home Economics and Industrial Arts departments offered classes to prepare teenagers vocationally for their adult lives. The focus of these departments was skills needed to succeed in daily living.

Classes in Home Economics included Foods I and II, Clothing I, II, and III, Child Development, Family Living, and Home Furnishing. These classes stressed the organizational and management techniques needed in today's fast-paced, high tech homes. No longer were foods students learning traditional cooking skills, but use of microwaves and food processors were part of the instruction.

The Industrial Arts classes included Woods I, II, and III, Metals I, II, III, Drafting, Industrial Management, Power Mechanics I and II, Graphic Arts I and II, and Electricity I and II. These classes helped students interested in a vocation get the basics in use of tools and management of industrial shops. Modern equipment was demonstrated, including drafting with computers.


Social studies


Social Studies students had the opportunity to put current history in perspective by studying the past. Classes in U.S. History and World History traced the changes in our world and society to examine how we got where we are today.

Central 9 students trained for their futures in vocational careers ranging from horticulture to printing to metal shop to business. Students were introduced to a range of vocational activities and projects which led many to permanent jobs through the placement program.

Students for Central 9 were selected through an application process. Students wishing to enter the school must qualify academically and be rated by teachers are having the potential for success in their chosen career. It was highly selective and only those at the top of their vocational interests were accepted. Central 9 students attend one-half day at their home high schools and the other half in the vocational program. The on-hand training and extra-curricular activities provided opportunities for students to explore their futures. Students found no replacement for job experiences.

After 21 years at the helm of Greenwood Schools, Dr. Earl Blemker decided to retire to a life of golfing and playing with his grandchildren. Over the years he witnessed many changes in the schools including the building of the present high school, the addition of the auxiliary gym and pool complex, the building of the football stadium, and many building changes in the middle and elementary schools.

Dr. Blemker's major responsibilities fell into the financial realm. As a physics, math, and chemistry major, Dr. Blemker was no stranger to figures. He kept the Greenwood Schools moving forward despite changes in the financial base for Indiana education. One of his greatest disappointments was the defeat of the referendum in February.

Policy makers


Varstiy continues winning tradition




Magee leads spikers

Semi-State. Bill compiled a 26-8 record.













Inexperience nails freshmen

Enthusiastic



The hard work and high spirits continued throughout the school year. The squad's enthusiasm culminated at homecoming and sectional.












