














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...on the Roof

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


...Council


Another program that Student Council is in charge of is the MORP. MORP is the opposite of the prom.



WASC (Wharton's Advanced Speech Class) undertook a creative project which combined their speech skills with visuals to produce an orientation video tape. Used for the first time with incoming freshmen in 1989, the tape features GCHS-its activities, its personalities, its academics, and its policies. 
...Sunshine Society

...On the road to the Final Four

The varsity football team had a storybook season in 1988, losing only to Franklin Central in a heartbreaking Semi-State battle. The Woodmen's 12-1 record is the best in County and school history. It includes an undefeated regular season, the first in school history, a third straight Mid-State conference title, and the school's first ever Sectional and Regional titles. The team was ranked 7th A.P. and 11th U.P.I. in the final polls taken at the end of the regular season.

The Woodmen proved to be better than those rankings in the playoffs, though. They upset 9th ranked Rushville at Rushville, beat 11th ranked East Central at Brookville, and then upset 6th ranked Seymour at home for the Sectional Championship.

The team had many outstanding performances during the 1988 campaign. The offense was lead by a trio of seniors,

Todd Robbins, Bill Hotopp, and Brad Reed. Todd Robbins passed for 915 yards on 99 attempts and threw 6 touchdown passes. Bill Hotopp led the county in rushing by gaining 1,000 yards on 210 carries. He also rushed for 13 touchdowns. Brad Reed had a stellar season rushing for 411 yards on 37 carries, catching 38 passes for 897 yards and 6 touchdowns, and he returned four kicks for scores.


The defense was outstanding throughout the season, allowing only 112 points all year long, with only 28 of those coming in the playoffs. James Hogan and Mike Thomas led the team in tackles. Kris Sawyer and James Hogan led in sacks, and Brad Reed and Mike Thomas had 9 and 4 interceptions each. Brad returned one of those interceptions 55 yards for the clinching score in the Sectional Championship.

The kicking game was also

excellent during the season, with Shawn Springer leading the way. Shawn set school and county records for most season and career field goals. His punting was also excellent.

The players received many awards for their performances during the year. Brad Reed was named Most Valuable Player and was the Rick Machledt Mental Attitude winner. Steve Moan was the winner of the Mike Neeley Most Valuable Lineman award. Brad was also named to the AP 1st team All-State and Steve was named to the UPI and AP 1st team All-State. Brad and Mike Thomas received spots on the 1st team Academic All-State team. Eight Woodmen were named the All-Conference team.

Coach Scotten was also honored by being named as a coach for the South in the Indiana North-South All-Star game.







Good special teams play, led by the kicking of Jason Jarboe, and punting of David Johnson, also helped contribute to the Woodmen efforts.

The Boys Cross Country Team had a very successful season even though they were without one of their top runners, Andy Dalton, who was out due to a stress fracture.






...Brinking on success

Although the freshmen finished with a weaker record than they hoped for, they made great strides throughout the season. Their relentless aggressiveness on defense was just one of their many strong points.




"The band performed very well this year and I'm not at all dissatisfied with their performance," comments band director Jon Sutton. "The band had a good work ethic and tried real hard to do what we requested of them. This was evident in the results that they received during the year. We tried to do innovative maneuvers through both a music and drill viewpoint and the band did a good job pulling them off."

The season started early for Greenwood with their summer practices in June and August, where they learned music fundamentals and got a better understanding of their music. After that came a string of Invitational contests in which Greenwood placed well in each. Their first contest was on September 17 at the Lawrence Central Invitational, which they won along with the music, general effect, marching, auxiliary, and percussion caption awards. Later that night at the Carmel Invitational, the Marching Woodmen were first again, also winning the music, marching, auxiliary, and percussion caption awards. A week later on September 24, Greenwood competed at the Center Grove Invitational where they placed third, behind Centerville and































Lawrence North. They also won the percussion and auxiliary caption awards.



















...at Christmas




...Language
















... Mathematics













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...Physical Ed

The offerings of Central 9 enhanced the vocational education of GCHS students. Given the opportunity to specialize in trade, students spent half their day at C-9 concentrating on their vocational choice. The rest of the day was spent in required classes at the high school.

Central 9 offerings range from business classes to classes in horticulture, auto body, welding, printing, auto mechanics, building trades, and health occupations. Students were given the opportunity to complete practical tasks as they became proficient in vocations.

Selection for C-9 is based on an application. Students are rated by their teachers and counselors as to their aptitude for their choice and on their academic performance. Central 9 has a limited enrollment.




















...Computers

It was a good feeling having the transition to the high school over with, now the Sophomores could look ahead to the contributions they would make to Greenwood High School.


